Weekly Livestock Market Report

SUMMARY
OTTAWA, October 6. — A fairly good performance was staged in the cattle market this week with virtually all classes of cattle clearing out at fairly steady rates, despite a rather liberal supply. There was little or no change in prices as compared with those prevailing a week ago. Late advices from St. Paul, Minnesota, indicated a little firmer trend and any further improvement in southern markets is likely to be reflected in a stronger demand for shipping cattle on Canadian yards. Calves were in good demand and sold firm to stronger at all markets except Toronto where, under a poor demand toward the close, prices were down \$1. The trend of the hog market was rather erratic but the net result of the week's trading was lower prices at the close. The decline at most centres amounted to about 15c. There was nothing of outstanding interest in the sheep and lamb division and prices were moved out at generally steady to firm prices, with the exception of Toronto where prices were shaded slightly.

Cattle Prices
Cattle prices were generally unchanged at Toronto. Weighty steers had a better enquiry up to \$6.50 with choice ones bringing the week's top of \$6.75. Butcher steers and heifers ranged from \$3.50 to \$5.50, while the stockers offered were steady from \$4 to \$5. Montreal made a good clearance at firmer prices with good steers moving out at \$5.75 to \$6.50, the latter price representing the high for the week. Considering the liberal run at Winnipeg, the supply was well taken care of and prices were moved out on a steady to firm basis. Liberal buying orders on outside account materially assisted, and the demand for stockers and feeders broadened out, partly due to an improved market in the east. Very few steers offered at Winnipeg this week were of good enough quality to sell from \$5 to \$5.50, the latter price being the high for the week. Choice ones brought \$4 and some very good small cattle were offered from boys' and girls' calf clubs at Langenburg and Boisevain, the prize winning animals out of the consignment, making \$10 to \$12 and the balance from \$9.50 down. Calgary was about steady with good to choice butcher steers at \$4.75 to \$5.75, while Edmonton cleared up supplies readily at steady prices until the closing day when butcher steers dropped 50c in spots. The top of the steer division was \$5. Prince Albert was active up to \$4.50 for good steers, while \$4.50 and \$5.00 were offered with the previous week and had good killing steers between \$4 and \$4.50. Regina was about in line with last week and took good prices from \$4.50 to \$5.00 and good choice at \$5. Saskatoon reported mostly poor quality cattle on offer and had nothing better than medium steers at \$4.50.

MOOSE JAW FEEDER SHOW AND SALE
Receipts at the Moose Jaw Feeder Show and Sale included 130 calves, 105 yearling steers, 145 two year old steers, 5,500 feeder lambs, and 2,500 breeding ewes. Feeder lambs ranged mostly from \$5.75 to \$6.50 and averaged \$6, while the breeding ewe sale was very satisfactory with yearling ewes averaging \$5 each, two year olds making \$5.10 to \$5.60 each, and three and four year olds \$5.40 to \$6 each. One lot of the latter class made \$8.10. Aged ewes made \$2.20 to \$3.20 each. The feeder stock sale was held on Friday, October 7th.

THE UNITED STATES MARKET
There was very little change in American cattle markets. Buffalo and Chicago were about the same as quoted Canadian steers at \$7.25 to \$8 and bulls from \$5.85 down. Reports from St. Paul indicated a little stronger trade. Exports for the week were 814 beef, 420 dairy, and 593 calves. Total shipments to date this year were 40,470 beef cattle, 8,792 dairy, 38,939 calves, and 95 hogs, compared with 163,009 beef, 69,106 dairy, and 4,436 calves, and 61,121 hogs in the same period last year.

BRITISH MARKET QUIET
Demand for fat cattle on British markets continued dull and store trade was also quiet in England and Wales but some improvement is reported in Scotland. There continues to be a ready sale of good quality cow and heifer calves which have been prevailing recently. Canadian cattle from the S. S. Deilian sold at Glasgow on October 6th, steers making 7 1/2c per lb. live weight and 4s 8c. There were 32 cows and heifers in the Montreal yards for export to Great Britain sailing on October 7th via S. S. Dakotian to Cardiff. This is a hand picked lot of good dairy cattle destined for Chester, England.

Calf Market Generally Steady
Calves opened steady at \$10 to \$10.50 at Toronto for tops but demand later fell off on account of the Jewish holiday and the market lost \$1 on Wednesday. Montreal had a good demand with best quality calves at high prices which cleared good strength and had best handweight veals at \$7 to \$7.50. Calgary sold good to choice veal calves from \$5.25 to \$6, while tops at Prince Albert and Moose Jaw were \$6, Saskatoon \$6.50, and Regina \$7.

HOG MARKETS
The hog run for the Dominion was 65,923 in the same week last year 67,339. Totals to date this year 2,357,926, last year 2,860,815. TORONTO opened 15c lower and held steady for the balance of the week, hogs at \$8.50 off trucks and some long hauls up to \$8.65. HAMILTON packers' prices opened at \$8.25 alive, \$11.25 to \$11.80 dressed, and closed at \$11.25 to \$12.00 dressed. MONTREAL had a good demand for calves, with the best up to \$10, and common to medium from \$7 to \$9. Drinkers were \$4.50 to \$6, and grassers which were about 75 per cent of the offering \$3.50 to \$4.25.

Total to Date This Year 26,785. Last year 9,256 cattle.
