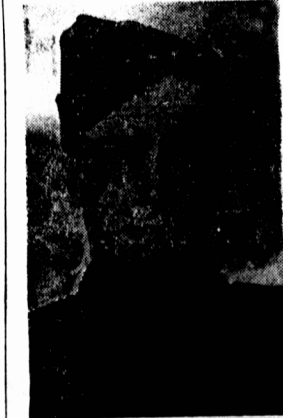

War—25 Years Ago Today

(By The Canadian Press) May 4, 1918—Viscount Fitch appointed Lord Lieutenant of Ireland and succeeding Lord Wimborne. German ground forces bombardment of British position from Leers south of Ypres.
