A SIMPLE OIL TEST

Answer: It is better to put pistons back in exactly the positions that they have been running in, because they and the rings have worn to conform with the cylinder bore.

When once pistons come down to lowest travel point is that the piston-pin holes in them are offset, that is, not bored through the axis of the piston.

Answer: Probably the magnets have become weak or there is too much clearance between the magneto coils and the magnets.

PARIS, April 8.—Former Premier Ribot, during the course of the debate in the Senate today, protested against the terms of the German note to the United States as regarded the French regions.

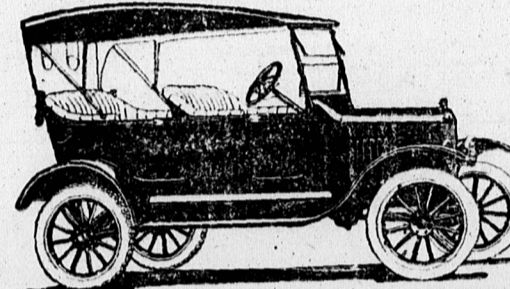
