BOOMING A PACIFIC COAST CITY.

Some four years ago B. F. Dickens of the Vancouver World staff conceived the idea of booming the city and inaugurated a Hundred Thousand Club there. Vancouver had then a population of less than 50,000 and the avowed object was to reach 100,000 by the year 1910. The World now affirms that this number has been attained. The Club, it appears, did not last long—only a few months in fact—but in its brief existence it was energetic and effective.

It advertised the town as a favorable location for business and manufacturing enterprise, and this partly by organizing and carrying out the greatest industrial parade ever seen in Western Canada. This was in April 1906, when miles of floats exemplifying Vancouver's industries paraded the streets and made the people of the city realize to what they had already attained. Civic pride was aroused and the interest of visitors from distant places was enlisted. And the boom has since been on, surpassing expectations.

Of course, many things were in favor of Vancouver, but beyond ques-

tion the special effort was worth the making and was productive of good. Here in Prince Edward Island, under less auspicious circumstances, a Two Hundred Thousand Club was started a year or so ago. It was less successful than in Vancouver, partly because it was taken up less energetically and was less heartily supported by our business men and manufacturers, but mainly because of the westward tendency of everything in these days. Still the effort was worth the making and it did some good, in this city, at least. And it is worth repeating, if only to teach our people the value of the resources and opportunities that lie at their doors. The westward fever has had and is having its day, but it will not last forever. Maritime Canada will not always be overlooked and side-tracked as it has been in the past. These Provinces lie between the great West and its European markets, and must some day share in the bustle, activity and progress which today is so much in evidence in the west and on the Pacific coast.

VERY LITTLE CHANGE IN THE FIRST DISTRICT.

The more closely the returns from the by-election in the First District of Queens are scanned the more apparent it will be that they give evidence of very little political change. The late Hon. Matthew Smith was a strong and deservedly popular candidate. His majority in November apart from the special votes was 75. Mr. Crosby's majority is now 69. It is well known that Mr. Simpson, the Conservative candidate in November last, did not make nearly so energetic a personal canvass as was made in the recent contest by Mr. Myers.

The larger vote polled just now over that brought out at the general election is easily accounted for by the close division of parties in the House, the importance of winning or holding this one seat and the concentration in a single division of the ablest speakers and most energetic workers of both parties. There were gains or losses at different polls, such as always occur when new candidates are before the people, but these changes about balance each other and are of little political significance. Still the situation.

The Government forces had the very slight gain with the Oppositive advantage of power and patronage, of having won the general election, and of being in line with the federal Government of the day, which last consideration counts for more than it ought to. The open voting also favors the party in power, by holding placemen and expectants of

favors, and preventing the defection of some who may have in heart changed their allegiance, but who are unwilling to publicly announce the fact. These considerations, however, apply with about equal force at a general election and a by-election. There is evidently a very close division of political sentiment not only in First Queens, but throughout the Province. The Government has need to walk very warily. It has had a long term of power, and the pitcher that goes often to the well in the end is broken. The promise to amend the onerous election law must be kept. The temporary advantage gained by withholding the ballot will not in the end compensate for the alienation of a public conviction strongly in favor of that measure. Slight as is the chance shown in the First District, the campaign and its immediate result have in them some lessons for the thoughtful men of both parties.

BY-LAWS Allowing Discount City of Charlottetown A By-law for allowing the rate of discount on the Assessment on Real Estate and Personal Property in the City of Charlottetown, for general Civic purposes, for the current year ending the 31st day of December, A. D. 1909. Be it enacted by the City Council of the City of Charlottetown, as follows:— 1st. A Discount, at the rate of Two and One half per cent (2 1-2 pc) shall be allowed to all Taxpayers who shall, on or before the 20th day of July, A.
