...Benjamin Bushey and Wm. Gilliam, Souris, and Capt. Kennedy of Kentville, N. S., have taken some good catches of mackerel of Souris harbor this week.

...W. B. Leard, tailor, Souris, will be a passenger by this morning's train en route to Tryon to attend the funeral of his mother the late Mrs. John N. Leard, whose death occurred yesterday at 2 a. m. after a lingering illness of paralysis.

...In the Christian Church, Montague, on Sunday evening next the minister will take for his subject—Do the Scriptures Authorize Infant Baptism. The sermon will be a review of a series of sermons recently preached in Montague on the subject.

...The many friends of Mrs. Andrew E. Paul and Nurse Miss Annie E. Cullen, both natives of this province, the latter being a daughter of James F. Cullen of Souris East, will be pleased to hear of them. Word received here reports that both had intended touring the States of Massachusetts and Connecticut during the hotter months of the summer.

...The Commissioner of Public Works and Engineers are at Montague in connection with the proposed new bridge. They also visited Mitchell River where another steel bridge is to be built this summer.

...The bridges at Sutherland Mill at Commercial Road are in a very dangerous condition and were both surveyed with a view to building new bridges. The work on the Montague will begin in August. The span is being built at New Glasgow, N. S.

...Chief of the United States Weather Bureau, in the opening lecture of the series he is to deliver before the Royal Institution in London, predicted, too, that the time will come when weather bureaus would have the added responsibility of mapping daily air routes of passenger-carrying aeroplanes; and intimated a belief that the dream of the meteorologist of forecasting the character of coming seasons may be realized.

...He said in part: "By the use of cinematography (photographing of moving objects) we are justified in believing that atmospheric phenomena 50 to 150 miles above sea level are now coming within the reach of accurate meteorological observation and calculation. We shall in the near future have a more intimate knowledge of the complex operations of nature in these high altitudes than we have today."

...Aviation is largely indebted to meteorology for its existence. The aeroplane is but a kite of the meteorologist with power and rudder attached, and that of aerial forecasting will be closer allied in the future than they have been in the past.

...The time may come when many of the 200 stations of the United States Weather Bureau and those of other weather services will be equipped with aviators and flying machines.

...It is no wild flight of fancy to assume that in the near future the weather forecaster will daily lay out the routes of the ships of the air.

...The geographic poles are attained. Man's future most interesting and hazardous and fruitful regions of exploration and research will be the high air and the deep earth.

Hazen, minister of marine and fisheries, was united in marriage to Miss Mollie Gertrude Creaghan, daughter of J. D. Creaghan, of Newcastle (N. B.). Miss Creaghan has been in New York for several weeks as the guest of her uncle, Hon. Samuel Adams, of New York, by whom she was given away.

Mr. Hazen left for New York at the first of the week and was accompanied on the trip by his mother, Mrs. J. D. Hazen.

On their return to the province Mr. and Mrs. Hazen will spend a couple of weeks on a camping trip and will spend the rest of the summer at Duck Cove.

BOY SHOTS CHUM. HOULTON, Me., June 5.—A bullet from the rifle of another boy with whom he was hunting woodchucks yesterday, caused the death of Richard Smith, a fourteen year old son of Wilbur Smith of this town. He died last night.

The other lad, William Finnegan, had raised the gun to shoot at a woodchuck when the Smith boy stepped in front of him and received the bullet in his lung. The authorities consider the shooting accidental and have taken no action against Finnegan.

CANADIAN TRADE AGENCIES

OTTAWA, June 5.—Negotiations have been opened by the Canadian government acting thru the trade and commerce department with the imperial government in England with a view of having the British consular service co-operate with the Canadian officials in extending the trade of Canada. This important step is part of the program mapped out by Hon. George E. Foster for the complete reorganization of the external trade service of Canada. There is to be in future a far more strict and efficient supervision of trade agencies from Ottawa. Richard Grigg, the new commissioner of commerce, will have oversight of the whole trade service and the collection and publication of statistics and information on trade matters in this connection, to co-operation of boards of trade to be sought and their experience turned to account.

HALIFAX MURDER CASE

HALIFAX, June 5.—A woman has appeared in the Hubert Grant case and, according to communications received from Auld's Cove, N. S., the man accused of the murder of Thos. Donaldson was not long ago engaged to a girl at that place, which engagement was broken off when he was arrested on the charge of breaking into Bonnar's store in Antigonish and stealing \$90 and several watches.

Learning a description of Grant, citizens of Auld's Cove recognized him as a man who became acquainted with a young girl in that place, in December last, and who subsequently became his fiancee. Her name is Ella Forrestall. Grant, it is said, went down there from Antigonish a little more than a month ago and proposed to her. Her parents looked with favor on the match.

Grant, it is further said, at that time spent money freely and gave it out that he had a large bank account. But the wedding never took place. A constable and a sergeant appeared on the scene and took Grant to his bed at five o'clock in the morning. He had, it is said, a revolver under his pillow. Grant at that time seemed to be a slave to the cigarette habit. He was arrested on a charge of stealing some \$90 and eight or nine watches from T. J. Bonnar's store. The case was settled out of court, and Grant was ordered to leave the country. He was seen soon afterwards in Stellarton.

When in Auld's Cove he said that he had a brother, a dentist in Boston. He is well known around Port Mulgrave and Auld's Cove. Edward Forrestall and Patrick Forrestall, of the latter place, are named as men who could identify him.

FRANCE ALARMED

PARIS, June 5.—Amid the deep agitation produced in the minds of the French people by the recent terrible break in crime and lawlessness throughout the country the question is now raised whether this is not the result of the substitution of secular moral teaching for religious.

It is pointed out that the present generation is the first to be reared into the world since the reorganization of the French educational system on a non-Christian basis, and the supporters of the churches declare that society is now reaping the natural results in morality.
