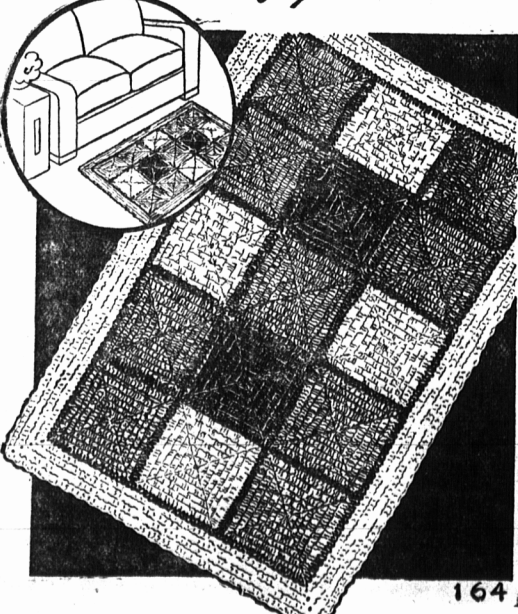

The Housewife And Her Activities

NO TRESPASSING
There's a mockbird's nest near my house on the crest of the hill overlooking the creek. And I have to look out, when I potter about, Or I get a sharp peck from a beak. First they lead me away, but if I want to stay Too near to that well-hidden nest. They swoop and then peck at my head and my neck. Until I abandon my quest. I've known them for years, but they swoop at my ears. If I stay there a moment too long, I've fed them with fat — though they pay me for that. With hours of most exquisite song. But I haven't a doubt, when the young ones are "out," That the parents will bring them to call. On the folks who put fat out of reach of the cat. And let the wild birds eat it all."

To remove dents from furniture, dampen the bruise or dent with warm water. Fold a piece of brown paper five or six times and soak it (folded paper) in warm water. Lay the moistened but not dripping wet paper over the dent, and on top a warm flat iron (not a hot one.) Letting it remain long enough to cause evaporation of water or until dent is raised even with rest of finished surface. Repeat process if necessary.

Wash the baby's shirts carefully. Dip them several times in lukewarm water and mild suds. Rub them gently with the fingers. Rinse them thoroughly in water of the same temperature as that used for washing and lay them flat on a towel to dry. Be careful not to pull the neck out of shape.

TINY LEAKS
If a water pipe leaks just the tiniest bit, wind it with adhesive tape and brush over with shellac. A small leak can be mended in this way very successfully.

THE HOT WATER BAG
Do not fill the hot water bag very full; it only makes it weighty for the patient and is really no hotter than the lighter bottle. After pouring in the water, press the sides of the bag and expel the gas and steam before putting in the stopper. This will give less strain to the seams of the bag when in use.

BATHROOM ETIQUETTE
Don't fail to have ventilation in the bathroom at all times. Don't forget to keep one or two guest towels on a special rack in readiness for the unexpected visitor.

Don't forget to fold the towels after each using. Nothing looks so disorderly in the bathroom as a lot of crumpled towels.

Don't keep an array of bottles and jars out on view on window sills and shelves. An inexpensive medicine cabinet will take care of

these things and prove just as convenient as when exposed to view.

REFINISHING THE HAMMOCK

DEEP FAT FRYING
Cut fish into individual servings, sprinkle with salt and pepper and dip each piece in flour next in slightly beaten egg and last in fine bread crumbs. Have fat at a temperature which will brown a piece of bread, then lower fish in fat in a wire basket, and cook until golden brown — drain on unglazed paper. When fat is smoking it is too hot and should be cooled.

BOILING

THE COOK'S CORNER

SCALOPED FISH
Any left over fresh fish may be used for this purpose.
3 tablespoons butter
3 tablespoons flour
1-2 cups milk
1 teaspoon chopped parsley
2 teaspoons salt
1-4 teaspoon pepper.

Melt butter, add flour, then the milk, cook until thick; add seasoning, parsley and lemon juice. Sprinkle top with buttered bread crumbs.

SALMON LOAF
1-2 tablespoons butter
1-2 tablespoons flour
3-4 cup of milk
1 teaspoon lemon juice
2 cups of flaked salmon
Salt and pepper to taste

Make sauce of butter, flour and milk — season to taste. Slowly add beaten eggs and stir well before adding salmon and lemon juice. Line baking pan with heavy wax paper before pouring in the mixture. Set pan in container of boiling water and bake in moderate oven for an hour or until fish loaf is firm. Decorate with slices of hard-boiled egg, parsley and sections of lemon.

Shoe Tongues

Women Who Have Passed the Middle-Age Period of Life Are Acclaiming Their New Freedom, Which Lets Them Do Worth-While Things

Among the things that intrigue me most about the last Mother's Day were the pictures of Mother that adorned the illustrated magazines and the advertising pages of the newspapers. Invariably she was depicted as a stout, squabby lady with gray hair neatly parted in the middle, wearing a lacy folded across her ample breast and held together by a large cameo brooch. Heavy puffed sleeves covered her dim eyes and her expression was that of one who had done with earthly things and was preparing to meet her Maker.

Apparently artists are still sold on the idea of Mother as always a decrepit creature hobbling around in the nineties. Whereas in reality most of the mothers we know are fortyish and don't look it, and are the most up-and-coming people in the community. The traditional Mother as a species, is among our disappearing fauna.

And if it is hard to find in real life a mother who looks like her Victorian portrait, still more difficult is it to come across a grandmother who lives up to what we have been taught to expect of her. For grandmothers aren't what they used to be. No longer do they sit on the shelf and wait for the end when grandpa dies. They start out to live their own lives for the first time. No longer do they sit in the chimney corner and wait for baby socks. They buy a ticket around the world, or set themselves up and go in for club work or motor cars, or get to be persons as well as mothers of Mary's or Tom's mother, and have more dates than a debutante.

The altered status of grandmas is forcibly illustrated by the Grandmothers Club which has been formed in Chicago with members in 15 and 16 states. The president, who has three grandchildren, heads the women's department of one of the big railroads. The secretary is a popular and highly paid lecturer. One member directs a \$2,000,000 estate. Another manages a gravel pit. One young thing of 72 sells insurance instead of in bedroom slippers, full of life and pep, proving that you can keep a good woman down by a few years and gray hairs and a scant crop of olive branches.

Perhaps even the founders of this club did not realize that they were writing a new chapter in the history of woman's progress, nor sensed that they were doing something about the despondent breasts of millions of their sex. But such are the moments and serendipities of their age. They proved to women that they could beat the rap of age and slow them down to the pace of grandmothers.

For this club symbolizes woman's emancipation from the taboos of the conventions of the past, when a woman at middle age was supposed to find her happiness in good deeds and serving others. When the modern woman counts her blessings, she may well go down on her knees and thank God that, instead of being old at 40, she is still young, goes strong and having the time of her life at 80.

The Grandmothers Club points the way out of the slough of despond in which so many women are engulfed when their husbands die and leave them to doze through a season of hope in the despondent breasts of millions of their sex.
