The regular fall or financial meeting of the Summerside District of the Methodist Church was held in the Methodist Church, Kensington, on the 30th inst. The meeting was opened by the chairman, Rev. A. D. McCully, B. D. After singing, the scriptures were read by Rev. F. A. Wightman, Financial Secretary and prayer was offered by Rev. W. R. P. P. and C. W. Strong.

There were also present the Revs. Thos. Stebbings, Tr. on Geo. A. Sel'ar, Grandville; H. S. Young, Margate; Elias Sackford, Royal; also George Morris, Stanley, a theological student at Mount Allison and Mr. Ball, a young man just from England, who will supply the Bedford Circuit for the coming year. The following laymen were present: C. W. Strong, Summerside; C. H. Wright, Bedouque and H. T. Pickering, Stanley. Rev. N. McLaughlin was detained by a funeral from attending.

The roll call being completed, routine business was taken up. The following is a synopsis: The finances of the district were reported and were found to be satisfactory. It is likely only one circuit within the district will receive financial assistance from the Mission Funds, namely Cape Wolfe, and this has increased its own giving.

The various assessed Connexional Funds were then apportioned to the several circuits and are to be collected during the year.

The educational and sustentation meetings are largely left to local arrangements. After the disposal of several communications and a general conversation respecting the work on the several fields the meeting was brought to a close.

A public meeting was held in the evening in the interests of missions at which Revs. McCully, Stebbings and Wightman delivered addresses.
