receipts are considerably lower than
in corresponding period last year
due to more direct sales from pro-
ducer to consumer. Prices have
lowered on chicken in compliance
with WPB Regulation. Fowl of-
fered is of good quality. Prices are
steady on fowl.

HOUSEHOLDERS CAN HELP STRETCH FUEL SUPPLIES

Short of volunteering for work
at the minehead, there can do
about increasing fuel production.
But he can do a lot about stretch-
ing the available supply.

Housewives who haven't missed
the annual spring cleaning for
years, and would rather die than
be caught with unwashed cur-
tains, often never gives a thought
to house-cleaning the furnace.
Yet, if all the furnaces in Cana-
dian homes were thoroughly
cleaned and checked during the
summer, the savings in coal would
add up to many thousands of tons.

Starting work on the furnace
now while repair men still have
time to do it, is what numbers
and heating men advise. By fall,
they expect to be so busy that
householders may have to wait
weeks before they can be served.

Housewives, who are handy
with a brush—and what house-
wife isn't—can clean the furnace
themselves. All that's needed is
the long-handled wire brush that
comes with the furnace, old
clothes and plenty of elbow grease.
Don't forget to do the pipes at
the same time.

Tubby can be pressed into ser-
vice—if he'll leave off wedding

the Victory garden—to help on
the mechanical end of the job. Get
him to take down the pipes, so
that damp air from outdoors
can't seep in.

Make sure that pipes, grate and
doors are all in good working
order. Heating pipes were scarce
last year, but there are some for
replacement now. If the grate sags
or if there are spaces between
teeth, it can be turned to a
new one. Loose fitting doors
may have major heat wafters. Be sure
fit tightly.

Lord Louis of the Southeast Asia Command



His new
bottle arena

August, 1942: Directed raid by nearly 10,000
commandos on Dieppe, France

ON handsome commando-fighter Lord Louis
Mountbatten falls the task of pushing the Jap
out of Southeastern Asia and avenging two bitter
British jungle defeats. Observers on every hand
have hailed the appointment of this storybook
hero as Britain's first supreme Allied commander.
Mountbatten assumes the job of driving the Japs
out of bloody Burma and Malaya with one of the
most glittering records of fitness to command of
any Allied chieftain.

A Royal Navy midshipman at 13, at 43 he is
a vice-admiral, an air vice-marshal, a lieutenant-
general. Since 1939 four destroyers have been tor-
pedoed under him; he directed the shelling of
Benghazi in the spring of 1941, and in August that
year became commando chief, then chief of com-
bined navy-air-air force operations.

In addition to Dieppe, he led his commandos to
St. Nazaire, France, and fought with the navy off
Norway. Sub-hunter Mountbatten first opened the
public eye in America when he visited as a pal
of his cousin, the Prince of Wales, in 1921. A year
later he came back on his honeymoon. He and
Lady Edwina are extremely wealthy, have a
multi-floored penthouse in London, but it's a
bomb casualty. Their two daughters, 17 and 12,
are war-guests of the Cornelius Vanderbilts in
the U. S.

Mountbatten was born Louis Francis Albert
Victor Nicholas Battenberg, but royal decree An-
glicized the surname. His father, of German nobil-
ity, became Marquess of Milford Haven when he
married a granddaughter of Queen Victoria, and
thus Mountbatten and King George are cousins.
At the outbreak of World War I, in which Mount-
batten served, his father had to resign as First
Sea Lord of the Admiralty because his brother-
in-law was grand admiral of the German fleet.
