The latest news, first of all.

Owing to the many other attractions not a large, yet a very appreciative audience listened to Major Bartlett deliver his excellent lecture on the French Revolution, in the Y. M. C. A. last night. The lecture was beautifully worded and showed careful and deep research into the history of France at that particular period. It was also illustrated by some sixty views, beautifully and in their story of the most tragic events the world has ever known. At the close a hearty vote of thanks was given to Mr. Peters and seconded by John Newson, was tendered the lecturer by American Consul Hale, who presided in a most efficient and pleasing manner.

Last evening New Wonderland was filled to its utmost with an audience that, judging from the prolonged applause, enjoyed every minute of the hour's performances. Kramer and Massey changed their program and their witty jokes kept their audience in roars of laughter. Mr. Massey's clarinet solo "Tramp, Tramp, the Boys are Marching," with variations fairly brought down the house, the execution being wonderful. Miss Kramer's solo "Are You Sincere" was a winner and the team work was fully up to their previous performances. The pictures were interesting and entertaining and the new illustrated song "Thorns in the Roses You Gave" with handsomely colored slides was beautifully rendered.

The scholars of the First Methodist Church Sunday School with their friends and parents are to be treated to a moving picture show and entertainment in the school room of the church tonight, commencing at half past seven o'clock. Miss Hazel Brunner and Miss Hortense Phillips have kindly consented to act as the entertainers of the evening with a song and reading, Arthur Gaudet and Stanley will give an instrumental duet, and the excellent Sunday School Orchestra will render several selections. Each scholar has the privilege of taking a friend and the parents are invited to be present with them. There will be no admission-fee and no collection taken. The entertainment starts promptly at 7.30 and will continue until about 9 o'clock.

An exciting ice boat race took place on the harbor yesterday morning, eight boats entering viz "We are here," "Clark and Murnhan," "Zero," "J. H. Herrell," "Devil," "N. Winchester," "Her Again," "D. Butler," "Skidoo," "C. Batt," "Hinkey Dink," "E. Flynn," "Topsy," "J. Praught" and "Hoboo," J. Herrell, at 11.34 sharp the starting gun was fired by starter, Dr. Alley and the boats got away. The course was four times around a triangle making twenty miles in all. The first round was made in eleven minutes with "Devil" in the lead, closely followed by "Topsy" and "Skidoo." The second round ten minutes, third fifteen and fourth, thirteen minutes, Winchester's boat "Devil," carried off first prize, finishing the twenty miles at 12.23 p. m., making the distance in 49 minutes. Praught's "Topsy," second finishing at 12.28, closely followed by Batt's "Skidoo," thirty seconds later. "Hinkey Dink," owned by E. Flynn came fourth. Unfortunately "We are here," the largest and best iceboat ever built on P. E. Island owned by Clark and Murnhan shortly before the race, while out on a trial spin, carried away her bow smashing it into three pieces and was thus unable to start, or the result might have been different.

Mary McLeod, relict of the late Duncan J. Buchanan, died at Ocean View, Lot 58, on Feb. 25th, 1909, in the 97th year of her age, being at the same time the oldest person in the community as a native of the parish of Belfast. Her good husband was drowned off Point Prim when in the prime of manhood, forty-two years ago, which bereavement she bore as a woman of true courage and perseverance, laboring hard to assist her family in every effort incumbent upon a dutiful and loving mother, and though attaining to such a high degree in years, she always maintained the useful habit of her former industry and economy, as a helping hand to others so long as she was able. Her mental faculties never failed her till the last. While the infirmities of age prevented her attendance at church, it was always her desire to have the Word of God read to her often, and it was quite apparent, towards her final earthly moments, that she rested her hope upon the merits of Jesus as her Savior. As a neighbor she was generous and obliging; many a stranger often partook of her cheerfully bestowed hospitality. Her funeral was largely attended. Divine service on the occasion was appropriately discoursed by Rev. Donald McLean, Charlottetown. The deceased was born at Glesven in October, 1812, being the second daughter of Donald McLeod, of Cnock, who was one of the earliest pioneers of that beautiful section of Belfast. Her surviving children are Donald, at Hedgesdale; John at Ocean View; Mrs. Wm. Huntley, Vernon River; Jessie, at New Bedford, Mass; and Flora, on the homestead, besides several grand-children, and many relatives and friends who all cherish her memory as one who was always respected and dearly beloved.—Com.
