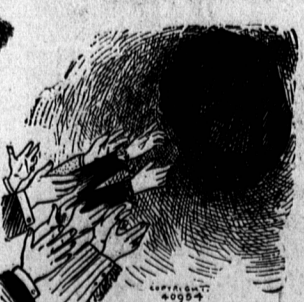

"IMPORTANT MEETING.—The Eastern Kings County Seed Fair Committee held a meeting in St. Mary's Hall, Souris on Saturday, January 31st. Despite the condition of the roads, there was a good attendance. The meeting was called to order at 2 p. m. A. J. McDonald, Souris West, was appointed chairman. The minutes of the previous meeting were read and adopted. At the suggestion of Mr. A. J. McDonald, a motion was made by Mr. Kinross, Rollo Bay, and seconded by James A. McDonald, that Governor Rogers and Mr. McKinnon, Commissioner of Agriculture, be invited to attend the Eastern King's Seed Fair to be held on or about February 25th. The motion was unanimously carried. The following committees were appointed to look after the different departments:—Roots and potatoes.—Messrs Peter Vineau and A. J. McDonald; grain.—Messrs J. McKinnon and William Howlett; small seeds, such as clover, timothy etc.—Messrs Joseph McRae and Theodore Robertson; poultry.—Messrs Michael Murphy and Andrew Jooney. Messrs James A. McDonald and William Whalen were appointed to assist the secretary, prepare tickets, etc., on day of fair. It was decided to send the prize list to the committee for distribution and also that prize winning grain, etc., must not be taken away before 4 p. m., unless there is a particular reason for doing so. It was moved by Mr. J. McKinnon, seconded by Peter Vineau and carried that the sum granted for the poultry show must not exceed \$40. A discussion on hand-picked grain then took place. After authorizing the secretary to make all necessary arrangements the meeting adjourned."
