THE RE-OPENING OF BAPTIST CHURCH

Recently Renovated and Repaired at Tryon

The Services Yesterday Were Large Attended—Appropriate Sermons Preached.

During the summer months the rebuilding of the Tryon Baptist Church has been going on until now it is brought to completion and was rededicated yesterday, Nov. 6th. Rev. D. Price who had charge of the pastorate for eight years preached the dedication service in the morning. It was very impressive and listened to by a large congregation. The other services of the day were conducted by the late pastor Rev. John Clark, Rev. A. D. McDoan and Rev. Mr. Stebbings, Presbyterian and Methodist pastors respectively of that village.

The old structure was built about half a century ago under the foremanship of the late James Hobbie and ever since through summer's heat and winter's snow worship was continued in the old building, dear to the hearts of many. Although for many years past the old church was found to be too small it was not until the regular annual meeting of the congregation on December 22nd, 1903 that the rebuilding of the church was agitated. However, in March of this year, tenders were called for and early in April the contract for rebuilding was awarded to J. M. Clark, Summerside. Operations were commenced on the foundation on July 2nd and the framewords of the new additions were completed on July 20th. The main building was not touched until it was formally closed on the last Sunday of July, when Rev. Mr. Bown of the Home Mission Board officiated.

From August to the present time, the work progressed very rapidly, under the superior foremanship of Benjamin Muttart, Summerside. The improvements are:—The roof of the building is raised about four feet, a vestry built to the south side of the church, the dimensions being 22 feet wide and 12 feet high, another portion to go to the choir is built on the north side, 34 feet long by 8 feet wide and lastly an immense steeple of 70 feet in height on the south side of church and west side of vestry.

The steeple consists of the tower, which is 8 feet square and 32 feet in height, a spire 33 feet in height and a very pretty ornament on top about five feet in length. Ornamental windows add greatly to the appearance and the whole exterior presents a beautiful place of worship reflecting much credit upon the workmen and their foreman. The painting also is very attractive and was performed by our local artist, Daniel McKenzie. The interior is even more beautiful than the exterior being all finished in birch of the first quality. The ceiling is arched and finished by diagonal squares in hard wood. The minister sits on a raised dais, about 22 inches high, extending 6 feet out into the church, in the form of a circle. Directly behind him, sit the choir within an immense arch which is very artistically finished in ash. The seats are arranged in the form of a circle from one side to the other, around the pulpit, giving seating room to about three hundred people.

The vestry and main church are separated by folding doors, which when thrown open will seat about sixty more. There is a ventilator in the ceiling of the main building, which is operated by a cord from the vestry. The woodwork of the interior is nicely stained. The work was performed by Mr. Mackenzie and his assistants. The building is heated by a furnace in the basement, installed by Mr. Mellett, of Souris, at the cost of over \$100. The whole cost amounts to about \$250, the contract for the wood work alone being \$1850. Much credit is due to Mr. Muttart for this monument of his skill as a carpenter, to Mr. Clark, the contractor, for the fine quality of the building material, to the architect, Mr. Baker, Summerside and Mr. McKenzie for the painting and decorating. The congregation must be congratulated for contributing so liberally to such a grand object and much praise is due the committee-men and trustees named below: Committee—Webster Bouler, Chairman; W. The funeral services were performed by Rev. James Simpson and the pall bearers were H. James Palmer, F. Parker Carvell, Frederick Perkins, Horace Marsard, W. W. Stanley, and W. F. Hildmarsh.

The directors of the Hillsborough Skating Rink Co. have decided to make some radical improvements in the building which they rely the ice surface will be enlarged 800 square feet. For some years it has been apparent that the ice surface was too small, and to overcome this defect a plan to meet the views of the large number of patrons as far as possible, it has been thought best to make these changes. The alterations will principally consist in raising the northern and southern promontories and allowing the patrons to skate underneath, and the directors feel that this change will remove any deficiency in the present building and give to Charlottetown an up-to-date rink, second to none in the Lower Provinces. These alterations will entail a large amount of expense, and as rink property in Charlottetown has never been a paying investment for the shareholders, the directors were doubtful about the wisdom of the course but in their earnest desire to please their patrons as far as possible, have decided to make the change.

Farmers requiring Government hay will please send in their names and addresses either to the Farmers' Institutes in their neighborhood or direct to the Secretary of Agriculture, Mr. John C. Readey, Charlottetown. The object of the Government is by this means to obtain an approximate estimate of the quantity needed, and they require the information in order that they may be in a position to apportion the hay when received. The Government would request the farmers to ask for only such amount of hay as is actually needed to maintain their stock during the winter. Farmers will be required to pay cash for hay delivered.
