Bulgarians Capture An Important Fort

and are fortifying their positions. (Canadian Press.)

SOFIA, Oct. 24.—Kirk Kileseh fell at eleven o'clock in the morning according to the latest reports received tonight from Bulgarian sources. Turkish troops retired in disorder in the direction of Bunanussar fourteen miles to the southeast leaving the battery of quick firing guns, sixteen ammunition wagons and large quantities of ammunition.

NEW YORK, Oct. 23.—A cable despatch from Paris contains the following account of the beginning of the war:

When the Sultan of Turkey gave orders for army mobilization he sent to the King of Bulgaria a sack of millet with the following letter:

Dear Ferdinand Effendi, Mobilize if you live, but be assured that there are as many soldiers in Turkey as there are grains of millet in this sack. Now, if you wish, declare war!

The King's reply was kind. He sent a very much smaller sack filled with tiny grains of a most virulent red pepper of the country, with it went the following dedication:

Dear Sultan, The Bulgarians are not numerous, it is true, but be assured that to stick your nose into their affairs is like sticking it into our national condition. Try it and see, they will sting you so sharply that the whole of Asia will not be able to save you!

Mr. Trivett went West as a missionary in 1878, and he has a wonderful fund of information, anecdotes, stories, etc. of that then vast and desolate country. Particularly worth listening to was his story of his relations with the Indians. A number of baskets were sold by Senator Prowse, who proved himself a capable auctioneer. The bidding was keen, and the proceeds of the evening amounted to quite a large sum. After a vote of thanks had been tendered the lecturer, the proceedings closed, all feeling that they had spent a most enjoyable time.

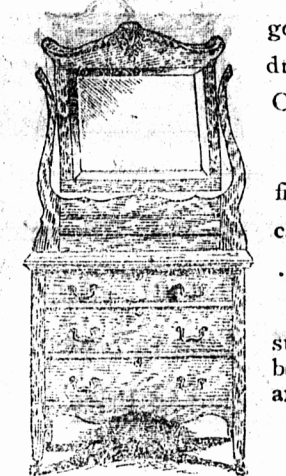

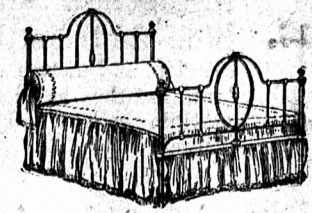

CUT THIS OUT AND PASTE IT UP

Almost every day The Guardian receives orders by mail to insert news matter of an advertising nature. In most of these cases the senders, who are frequently not known to any member of the staff and who have no

account in the advertising department, write "Please insert the following and oblige," thus apparently implying that they think the items will be inserted free. Only a few weeks ago a reader wrote asking that his advertisement of Farm for Sale be inserted free from day to day until he cancelled it, as he is a subscriber to The Guardian. In this connection it may be said that the subscription price is not sufficient to even pay the actual cost of paper, ink, presswork, mailing, bookkeeping and other expenses of the Circulation department proper, and thus subscribers have no privilege of free advertising and are on the same footing as non-subscribers. Seldom ever does the sender state whether the item is to appear Daily, whether for one or more times in either Daily, or in both, whether as a display advertisement, announcement, business local, classified ad or otherwise. When for church or charitable purposes they seldom ever say

so, or do not enclose sufficient money to pay for same, all of which will be returned by first mail in the event of the item not being chargeable, or if more money is sent than necessary to pay for the item the surplus will be returned at once, there being a greater discount for cash with order for advertising of churches &c than for regular business. In all such cases the Advertising department communicates with the sender as quickly as possible by mail or phone, often paying the messenger service to get them to the telephone if not too far distant, thus saving all possible time. Please write this office to know if News, Letters to Editor, etc., are charged for, and to all such there is but one reply—all items etc. of a money-making nature, even though they be somewhat of a news nature, are chargeable. For instance, the advance notice or notices of a concert, lecture, pie social, picnic, etc., are in the Morning Daily or in the Evening chargeable if there is an admission

fee, silver collection, sale of pies or sale of food or refreshments, etc. Advance notices of purely religious notices, even tho a silver collection is to be taken up, are not chargeable. The particulars of any of the above, after they have been held, are, however, news and thus not chargeable. The news of any past, present or future business, which is still being conducted, is chargeable, if it is apparent that the object is to make the business more widely known and thus increase it. Verses accompanying death notices are also chargeable. Even items which are actual news and not chargeable but once in either Morning Daily or Evening Daily or both are chargeable for more than one insertion, as they are thus not news. The above facts are given for the purpose of assisting persons who have items, etc., to mail to this office, so that delay and disappointment will be avoided.
