THE MARKETS

(Canadian Press) OTTAWA, April 24.—The condition of the egg market is steady owing to the fact that the competition for supplies throughout the country is keen and prices continue to be well maintained. It is reported that the basis for storing in Montreal is 2 cents per dozen higher than at this time last year and some dealers consider it too high and are doing comparatively no storing while others consider the values good and are storing freely.

MONTREAL, April 24.—The demand from the United Kingdom for Canadian western oats on the Montreal market today was steady and as cables in some cases were stronger at an advance of 1-2 per quarter. Some sales of No 2 grade were made for May shipment, but the trade in wheat and barley was reported slow. An easier feeling developed in the ocean freight market and rates to Liverpool, London and Manchester were reduced another 3rd per quarter with engagements of 25 to 30 loads of heavy grain late on Thursday to London at 2s per quarter and oats at 1s 9d per quarter, while the rates to other ports were unchanged.

The fact that the Island shores are wholly free from ice is also a great advantage to the fisherman.

Buster Keaton in class by Himself in Screaming Comedy at the Prince Edward.

Buster Keaton is in a class by himself, and in "The Navigator," his latest Metro-Goldwyn release which opened at the Prince Edward Theatre yesterday, he has contributed one of the best comedies ever made for sheer entertainment and real physical laughs. There isn't a faint moment in "The Navigator." In fact, yesterday's audience was kept in a continual state of hilarity with several spasms of hysteria besides. It's for the whole family; every one will be pleased, and there isn't an objectionable scene or thought in it.

The story, as written by Jean Haver, Clyde Bruckman, and Joseph Mitchell, Keaton's gag men, offers great opportunities for comedy, and Buster has taken advantage of every chance. The star appears as the sap of an old and wealthy family tree, who is not capable even of winding his own watch. He is refused by the girl of his dreams, and goes to take the honeymoon himself. He gets to the wrong line, and by a chance, the girl also comes aboard.

They are out drift, by some foreign revolutionists, and thus the two innocents are left without any crew to run an enormous liner. The fun that Keaton extracts from this situation is endless. He gets into the trouble possible, and there seems to be plenty of such opportunities on board a ship.

Buster makes coffee out of salt water, tries to open a deck chair, decides upon one of the ship's boilers as a suitable stateroom, descends to the bottom of the sea in a diver's suit, fights swordfish with their own weapons, gets caught by an octopus, and when they drift away the cannibals by a combined attack of Roman candles and coconuts. Just when everything seems to be over for them a submarine appears and they are saved.

The picture was directed by Donald Crisp and Buster Keaton, while Kathryn McGuire appeared as the beautiful heroine. It was photographed by Byron Houck and Elgin Lessley and presented by Joseph M. Schenck, and will be shown again today.

Herd of Wild Horses Menaced In Australia

ADELAIDE, April 24.—A new menace to the development of the interior pastoral or cattle country consists of the herds of wild horses, which according to the estimates of a leading authority, probably run in hundreds of thousands. He urged the Government this morning to introduce legislation for the eradication of the pests, which is possibly worse than wild dogs. Years ago many horses were taken far north for the purpose of breeding remounts for the Indian Army and draught horses, but this project was abandoned and since then breeding has been uncontrolled with the result that brambles are over-running the country, consuming water and food to the detriment and danger of valuable stock.
