OUR INDIAN WARDS.

The annual report on Indian affairs has been distributed, and shows that to a certain extent our Indian wards have shared in the general prosperity of the country. Their general health has been good, and they appear to be making gradual although slow progress toward more comfortable and less precarious methods of living. It is not true of all the bands it is claimed to be true of the majority of their number. An annual enumeration is made of the Indians in the Dominion and on July, 1903 the total was found to be 108,233 distributed as follows, the increase or decrease from 1902 being also shown:

The net gain in numbers during the year was 121. There were 2,311 births and 2,143 deaths. There was thus a natural increase of 168, the difference between this and the net gain being accounted for by migration across the international boundary. Hitherto it has been remarked that contact with civilization has brought about decline in the numbers of the Indian population, but the report speaks hopefully that the foot of this decline has been reached and some small gain in numbers may be hereafter looked for. The Indians of the United States, which are more than twice as numerous as those of Canada, increased from 249,273 in 1890 to 270,544 in 1900.

The annual expenditure on account of Indians in Canada averages over a million dollars voted yearly by Parliament, be-

sides which some \$275,000 a year is expended on their account from the Indian fund, which includes moneys secured to the Indians under treaty and from sales of land, timber, etc. surrendered by them. In the United States the expenditure for Indians in 1902 was over \$10,000,000, of which \$1,240,000 was for schools. Our own Indian expenditure is largely made up of payments under treaty, the support of industrial and other schools, the salaries of agents and the official staff, medical attendance and the relief of the aged and indigent. Canada is fortunate in the fact that her Indian population is thoroughly loyal, and mainly peaceful and law-abiding. This is largely due to the fact that the nation has always kept faith with its Indian war's and has strictly observed all its treaty obligations.

ACTIVITY AT SEOUL.

SEOUL, Saturday, March 14.—Detachments of Korean soldiers marching up and down the main streets in the neighbourhood of the Palace, at all hours of the day and evening, give an air of martial activity to this city.

GREAT "NAPOLEON" DEAD.

A YEAR'S BATTLESHIPS IN ENGLAND.

During the past year fourteen vessels, excluding torpedo craft, were added to the British navy, representing a tonnage of 149,340 and an indicated horse power of 262,800. The list includes five battleships, all of the "Duncan" class. These vessels are of 14,000 tons, and are the fastest in the British navy, their speed being 19 knots. Seven new armored cruisers have been commissioned, with the result that the cruiser squadron has been strengthened, and is now not only the most powerful but the fastest fleet in the world, all of the ships having a full-power speed of 23 knots. The ships commissioned this year include the "Drake" and the "Leviathan," of 14,100 tons, with engines of 30,000 indicated horse power. The five other cruisers commissioned are the "Kent," "Badford," "Monmouth," "Donegal," and "Berwick," all with the first exception, built on the Clyde. These vessels are of 9,800 tons and 22,000 indicated horse power. The remaining two ships commissioned during the year were the sloops "Merlin" and "Odin." The armament of the ships may be regarded as indicating the power of attack, and thus it is interesting to note that this year's newly-commissioned ships had in all twenty 12-inch guns, four 9.2-inch weapons, 106 6-inch quick-firers, and 230 smaller weapons.
