### ENTERTAINMENT AT NEW LONDON HALL

A most enjoyable lecture and entertainment was held in the New London Hall at Clifton on Thursday evening, Oct. 9th, under the auspices of the Women's Institute of Clifton. Before the lecturer of the evening was introduced the following program was admirably carried out: Opening chorus; Remarks by the chairman, Rev. G. W. Irvine; solo, R. M. Lamont; duet, Misses McGregor and McKay reading, Mrs. Irvine; solo, Miss Laura McEwen; reading, Geo. Green; solo, Rev. R. M. Lamont; chorus, Ladies of the Institute. It would be invidious to make any comment on the above numbers, except to say that the people of New London are pleased to hear again the splendid voice of the veteran Scotch singer, the genial R. M. Lamont, who is ever ready to use his singular gift for the promotion of Red Cross work or any equally worthy object. Of the rest of the entertainment space permits us only to say that every number was exceedingly well executed and received well-merited applause. The program concluded the speaker of the evening, Rev. Mr. Goodwill of Kensington was introduced to the audience by Rev. G. W. Irvine. In the introduction to his fine address, he congratulated the ladies on the noble work in which they were engaged, namely the sending of comforts to the gallant men at the front. He stated that it had been his intention to lecture on Astronomy in its relation to the Bible, but as he had failed to secure suitable slides for his lantern he thought it best to reserve that lecture for some future date. For the time being, he chose to discuss some salient features of the war. Some people tell us that it was German militarism that caused the war. There never was a greater mistake. Take the pugnacity out of an individual and you kill his manhood. Take the militarism out of a nation and you kill the nation. No, not militarism but commercialism in Germany pressed them into war. The commerce conditions of Germany had become so acute that the great Jewish bankers demanded war as the only alternative. The learned lecturer called attention to the growing influence of the Jew. Indirectly he started the war, and he will also bring it to a close. When, at the hands of the British and French the Jew is restored to his beloved Palestine, then and not till then shall we see the termination of this world-conflict. At many points in the course of his address, Mr. Goodwill co-related the prophecies of Holy Writ with the great events that are transpiring in these days. In all it was a most instructive and interesting address and the chairman voiced the sentiments of everyone in the hall, when he heartily thanked the speaker for his splendid address and expressed the hope that the good people of New London may soon have the privilege of hearing the reverend gentleman again. Notwithstanding the fact that it was a stormy night, the Hall was comfortably filled and about \$40 was taken at the door. This is to be devoted to Red Cross work, and we understand the ladies of the Institute intend having several lectures for patriotic purposes during the coming winter.

### IN MEMORIAM

NEIL MCLEAN PASSES AWAY

Neil A. McLean, one of the leading big contractors of the Pacific Coast, passed away in San Francisco on Tuesday morning after making a vigorous fight for life for the past two years. While the death was expected, it came as a severe shock to many prominent San Franciscans as well as to the residents of Southern Marin, for he was a big man in every sense of the word, charitable, fair to his employees, the business world and to his patrons, and was an ideal citizen. The funeral, held from his late residence in San Francisco, on Thursday, was attended by many from the highest to the lowest.

The remains were laid away in the family plot in Woodlawn cemetery. The deceased was born in Prince Edward Island in 1862 and as was customary with his fellow playmates, followed the sea for a few years until he married and settled down in Boston, Mass., and followed the trade of carpenter. He came to California 30 years ago, and for over 15 years made his home in Belvedere.

For six years, he and his brother, Daniel A. McLean, of Belvedere, were associated as building contractors. Later on they dissolved partnership. Mr. McLean, during the last ten years, took several million dollars worth of building contracts and executed them promptly on time and to the satisfaction of the owners.

Among the contracts executed by him was that for barracks, dispensaries, etc., at Fort Winfield Scott, amounting to \$500,000; food products building, the second largest one at the late exposition in San Francisco; New York and Pennsylvania State buildings; Press Building; annexes to the Stewart Hotel, Chronicle building, and Merchant's Exchange, and many of the leading garage buildings in San Francisco.

He was one of the oldest and enthusiastic members of the Corinthian Yacht Club and sailed on several of the winning yachts in several prominent races. He was on the Corinthian when she defeated the Challenger. He enjoyed and encouraged outdoor sports, especially yachting.

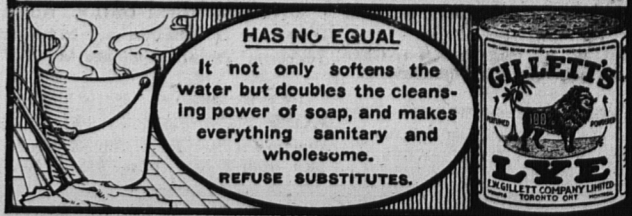
He was a good family man and leaves a wife, Margaret McLean, and the following children: Bessie, Annie, William, Mary, Flora, Margaret and Edith McLean; a brother, Daniel A. McLean, a prominent building contractor and a member of the Marin County Exemption Board, to mourn his death.

He was a thirty-second degree Mason, a Knight Templar, Mystic Shriner, and a Royal Arch Mason.

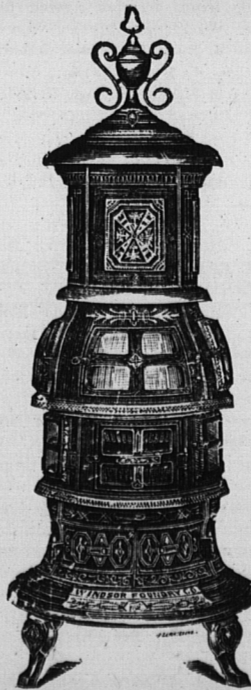
