BURIED A MAN ALIVE. WASHINGTON, Feb. 16.—According to Mail advices from the Philippines, Captain Novasco, the insurgent officer who commanded the band which captured Lieut. Gilmour and party of the Yorktown and held them captives for many months, has been sentenced to imprisonment at hard labor for life, on a charge of having permitted one of Gilmour's party to be buried alive. The victim was a sailor named McDonald, who was a burden to the Filipinos because of his wounds.

POPULATION OF ITALY. ROME, Feb. 18.—The result of the first Italian census in twenty years has proved a surprise. It shows that the population is 35,000,000 while it was not expected that it would exceed 31,000,000.

A VELASQUEZ FOR \$80,000. The trustees of Boston Museum of Fine Arts have bought a large painting by Velasquez, "The Prince Baltazar Carlos and His Dwarf," a characteristic example of the great Spanish master. It comes from the private collection of the Earl of Carlisle, in whose residence Castle Howard at York, England, it has hung for many years.

TYPHOID IN HORSES. OTTAWA, FEB. 18.—The Department of Agriculture has issued a bulletin by Duocan McEchran, chief veterinary inspector upon typhoid fever in horses. The disease occurs in forms so well marked that it is given a place in professional nomenclature as distinct disease.
