"But how can you call a girl who is generous and nice to other girls 'bad'?" I protested.

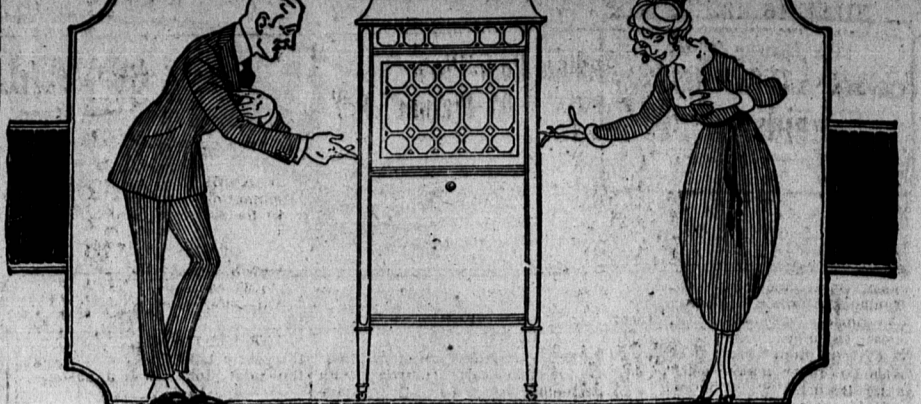
