The latest news, first of all.

Mr Willis, formerly of the S'side Journal, was in S'side yesterday looking hale and hearty. Many of his old friends were pleased to meet him.

Mrs (Rev) D. G. Schurman of Togo, Man, who is visiting friends in this province, is now in S'side the guest of her brother M. F. Schurman.

It has been decided to hold a plebiscite in Summerside in connection with the Civic Election on Tuesday next to ascertain whether the majority of the people are for or against doing away with the water and Sewerage Commissioners as a separate body of officials and placing the whole business in the hands of the town council.

Alexander McDonald whose death at Rexton, N. B., was reported in yesterday morning's Guardian, belonged to the western part of this Province and lived in Summerside a number of years. He owned the property on Water Street, now occupied by H. V. Higgins. He also owned and sailed a small schooner. Three years ago last fall he moved to Rexton where he has since resided.

The regular monthly meeting of the Summerside Board of Trade was held last night. There was a very large amount of important correspondence on different subjects which were handed over to the different committees to deal with and report at a future meeting. Among them a lengthy correspondence from the Charlottetown Board of Trade asking the co-operation of the Summerside Board re changes in the P. E. I. time table for the coming summer. This was handed over to a committee to deal with. A plan prepared and drawn up by surveyor Mollison at the instance of the Board re changes and improvements in the Railway yard and wharf brought out considerable discussion. A request from the mud haulers asked that the Board intercede for them in getting cars to enable them to carry on their line of work without loss of time. Letters were read from the authorities at Ottawa assuring the Board that the changes and improvements asked for in the Summerside Post Office would be attended to at once also that the Armoury building would be erected during the coming summer.

H. M. Baker says that the Patriot and Examiner must have been misinformed in the matter of refereeing the hockey match at S'side last Tuesday night and says further that he was not selected to act in the capacity of referee.

Weather conditions around this Province during the winter season are very uncertain. Eight years ago the S. S. Starry ran on the Summerside-Tormentine route all winter with very little interruption. Seven years ago the Stanley left Summerside Harbor on the twelfth of January and was unable to reach any port until the eighteenth of March, when she entered Picton Harbor with the S. Minto in tow. This winter a gale with a sail fixed upon it was able to navigate the waters east of the Island and speed along for more than a hundred miles without interruption. Past records show many strange conditions of weather and winter navigation.

PARDON IS ASKED SO HE CAN GET A JOB.

A Washington despatch says: Within the next few days President Taft and Attorney General Wickereham will be asked to consider one of the queerest pardons for a federal prisoner which have come to light in many years. The basis for the clemency to be asked is that the Pennsylvania Railroad promised to give the convict immediate employment. When the Enterprise National Bank of Pittsburg failed, several years ago W. M. Harvey, a bookkeeper in the institution, was sent to the penitentiary. The cashier, who confessed that he had looted the bank, committed suicide, but Harvey, considered one of his right-hand men, faced the music.

Representative Graham, of Allegheny, and other influential men of that city interested themselves in his case, and shortly after Mr Taft was inaugurated, Harvey's sentence was commuted, so that, with time off for good behavior, he would be set free next September.

In order to get the Pennsylvania railroad position, however, Harvey must be given his liberty before the end of this month. On that day he will be 45 years old, and the rules of the Pennsylvania do not permit the employment of men older than forty-five.

STOCK MARKET DULL AND SAGGING

NEW YORK, Feb. 16--The stock market gave additional evidence today of sinking into dullness and apathy. The professional element strained all its resources to keep up the movement of prices, but the withdrawal of outside participation in the dealings adds to the difficulty of the attempt. The situation is summed up in the fact that urgent liquidation had ceased to press upon the market, while no disposition makes itself manifest to accumulate stocks with sufficient determination to carry prices upward and hold them there.

The desire to see the definition of the scope of the Sherman anti-trust law, which shall emanate from the supreme court decision in the American Tobacco and Standard Oil cases, is the accepted motive for refraining from large commitments in the market, on the part of capitalists of the class which makes the great speculative movements. Besides that influence, there is a normal subsidence to a resting point in the market after the wider fluctuations of the active speculation which followed the important liquidating movement since the first of the present year. From the low prices of Monday of last week, marking the culmination of that liquidation, the rebound has been substantial, reaching to over eleven points in Reading, which led to the recovery. Efforts to extend the recovery centred on that stock today.

The professional operators who were conducting the movement found insufficient demand to absorb profit-taking sales and took warning from this fact of the limitation of that market. Finding themselves almost alone in the buying of stocks, they desisted and allowed the dealings to lapse into a condition of semi-stagnation. Foreign influences were not definitely in favor of advancing prices. The assembling of the new British Parliament brings into play the influence of the new political program to be formulated. A rise in the privilege discount rate in Berlin and the prospect of heavy loan issues in Paris in the rehabilitation of food damage had some reflected influence here from foreign markets. More attention was paid to these accounts of the hope that is growing up, of an improved demand for American corporation bonds on the part of foreigners. Speculators were disappointed that the Canadian Pacific dividend was not raised and there was a sharp break in that stock in London. The diminished force of the current of the price movement was seen in the hesitating uncertainty of the narrowing fluctuations. Bonds were steady; total sales, par value, 2,510,000. United States bonds were unchanged on call.
