DOES THE MOON GO ROUND THE EARTH

If our world were stationary in space the moon would travel in a nearly circular path around us. However, both the earth and the moon are rotating around the sun and the actual path of the moon through space is, therefore, a circle made with a wavy line much like the path of a snake travelling around in a circle.

Furthermore, if you plot the orbit of the earth around the sun to a scale which will make it 400 inches (thirty three and one third feet) in diameter, the orbit of the moon would be only one inch. At no point would the plotted path of the moon be convex toward the sun.

Speaking in the absolute sense, the moon doesn't revolve around the sun in company with the earth.

And if you wish to dig in still deeper, you will find that the sun together with all the planets is travelling through space as a unit at tremendous speed. To an observer on another star the moon's path would appear to be a complicated sort of a spiral. The shape of the spiral would depend on which star the observer chose as an observation point.



There are four kinds of Tea:

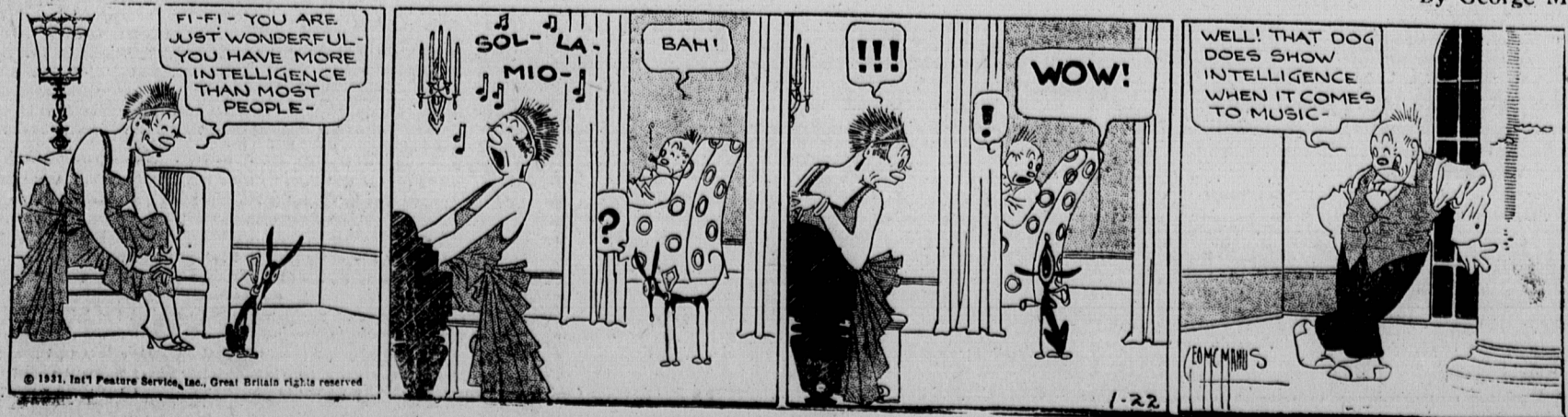

MANCHESTER, Eng., Jan. 21—(By The Canadian Press)—A woman correspondent of THE MANCHESTER GUARDIAN says:

"Lady Willingdon has many qualifications for the position she will occupy. Perhaps since Lady Dufferin left India—Lord Dufferin was also Governor General of Canada some years before he went to India—the wife of no Viceroy has had so much experience of high official life in various countries.

"As a child she made the acquaintance of many countries during her cruises on Lord Brassey's famous yacht, Sunbeam. During the war Lord Willingdon was Governor of Bombay, and his wife was active in schemes for the benefit of the soldiers, just as she has been active promoting social work during her years in Canada. A woman of strong personality, a brilliant hostess and interested in many aspects of life, she is not only herself active but she has the art of stimulating others.

"When in Bombay Lord and Lady Willingdon were untiring and unsparring themselves in promoting and supporting all manner of projects for welfare work, for alleviating sickness and suffering, and for the spread of enlightenment. The same untiring and unsparring energy was devoted to their social duties, and Lady Willingdon's reputation as a hostess has never been rivalled even in India.
