Criminal Libel Suit Continues At Montreal

(By Frank Flaherty, Canadian Press Staff Writer) MONTREAL, Dec. 21—Dealings of the Sun Life Assurance Company of Canada and of several of its officers in the securities of the Middle West Utilities Company were disclosed at the trial of James J. Harpell, publisher of business newspapers, for criminal libel today. Thomas B. MacAulay, President of the Sun Life and other officers of the company who subscribed to a syndicate which purchased stock in the middle west company reaped a profit of 25 percent on the money they paid in. Prior to the trial a commission from the Quebec Court of King's Bench sat in Chicago and examined Patrick J. Fallon, treasurer of Insull, Son and Company, Inc., who disclosed the Chicago transactions. Evidence taken by the commission was read in court today. Insull, Son and Company Inc. were managers of the syndicate which underwrote a block of Middle West stock.

Preference on Eggs

Eggs will have a tariff from June to December of two pence a dozen against British countries and four pence a dozen against foreign countries. The former preferences of 12-1-2 percent which Canada enjoyed on salt, smoked or pickled fish, cheese, flour and oats remain unchanged. The preference on wheat, potatoes and fresh meats also remain the same. During the calendar year 1931 Bermuda imported goods to the value of 991,219 pounds sterling of which 40 percent came from the U.K., 39 percent from U. S. and 18 percent from Canada.
