The contention of the Council in discontinuing the granting of relief is that the City has already paid \$10,000 as its share of the grant, which is paid in equal amounts by Federal, Provincial and Municipal Governments, and that the City is not in a position to continue the payments.

The third best performance in French was "Une Affaire D'Or" (1st act) by Marcel Gerboud which Les Amateurs Du Gesu De Montreal presented. It gained 63 per cent of excellence.

Harvey in his findings, "and it is my opinion that the Dominion Drama Festival, so happily inaugurated, will go on from success to success, being founded, as it obviously is, on an intellectual desire, and carried through on lines of good sense and understanding."

The awards which were announced this evening by Col. H. C. Osborne, Honorary Director of the Festival on receipt of them from Mr. Harvey, come of the culmination of a week of intensive dramatic presentation in Ottawa. Following eleven regional festivals which were held throughout Canada, 24 dramatic groups, winners in their own particular region, assembled here at the beginning of last week and presented their plays before the adjudicator in the Ottawa Little Theatre.

Received Hearty Congratulations On His Birthday

The following tribute to Hon. J. A. MacDonald, M. P. is from the Montreal Standard of April 29:

Elected to Parliament for the first time twenty-five years ago, Hon. John A. MacDonald is one of the veteran parliamentarians of the Maritime Provinces. Consequently it is not surprising that he was the recipient of the hearty congratulations of his friends the other day, the occasion being his 59th birthday.

Hon. Mr. MacDonald has represented King's County, P. E. I. in the House of Commons since 1926. He was first returned to the Prince Edward Island legislature in 1909, was re-elected in 1912 but went down to defeat in 1919.

In 1923 he contested the seat again and was victorious and became Minister of Highways and Public Works in the Provincial cabinet.

Two years later he forsook the local field and contested King's County for the Federal House, making the grade after a close contest. He was called to the Cabinet without portfolio and he was the only Conservative returned from "The Island" in the fateful election of '26.

The biggest fight in Mr. MacDonald's career came in the summer of 1930, when he faced that doughty Liberal Dr. Thomas Grant on the hustings in King's County. Once more he scored a signal victory in a riding which had sent only one Conservative to Ottawa from 1890 to 1926.

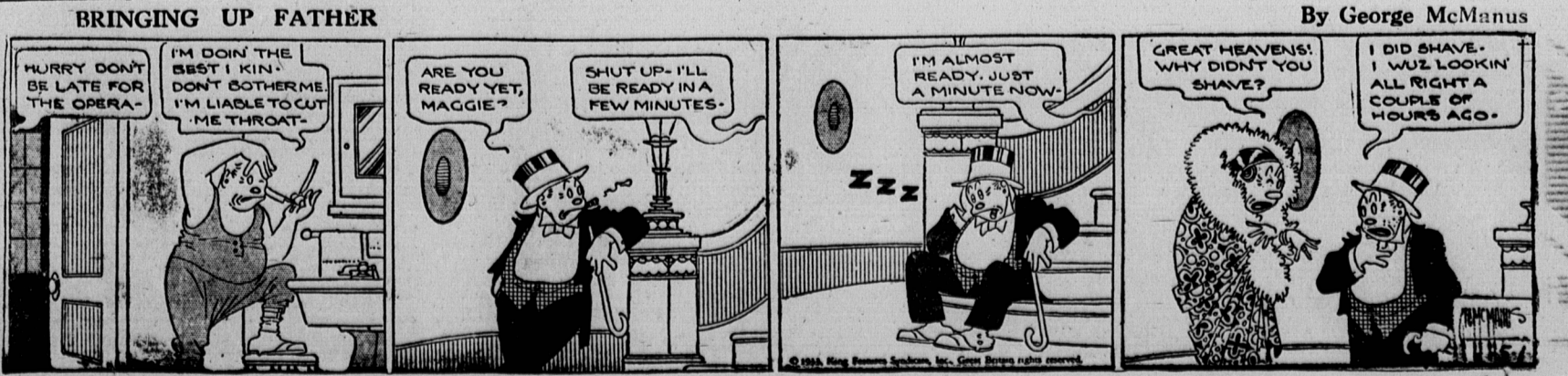
