Columbia and Nicaragua are Negotiating a Settlement of Their Differences.

THE KAISER SAILS TO PAY A VISIT TO THE CZAR

HAYTI, COLUMBIA AND NICARAGUA.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 4.—(Special)—Capt McCreem of the gunboat *Maichas* cables that the trouble in Hayti is practically over.

Negotiations have been opened with Washington for the establishment of an entente cordial between the governments of Columbia and Nicaragua.

Ministers of both countries are carrying on the negotiations. It is expected that the difficulty between the two countries will be settled.
