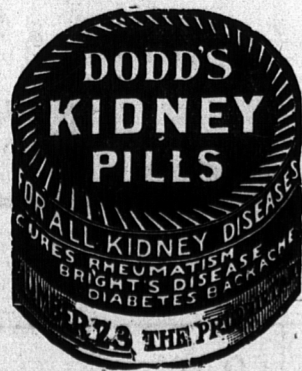

WHAT LAUGHTER DOES TO KEEP YOU WELL A REAL HEARTY GUFFAW EMPTIES LUNGS AND BRINGS AIR INTO INMOST RECESSES. JOLLY PERSON OFTEN HAS GOOD COMPLEXION. People Who Laugh Frequently Grow Fat, and Fat is Good in Moderation.

Chicago Herald. What is laughter? Is it a feeling, a physical or an intellectual phenomenon, or is it something else or a combination of all of these? The preacher in the Old Testament says: "As the cracking of thorns in the pot, so is the laughter of fools." Yet the gem of wisdom falls to tell you that laughter has benefits that are directly physiological as well as a rare ration for the intellectual appetite. This is half consciously but not fully sensed by those who think very truly that people who laugh must grow fat, while those who are bitter and acid by nature are as slim as life might be expected to permit.

Caesar realized the virtues of full flesh when he said to Antonius: "Let me have men about me that are fat; Fiction has it that Sanchio Panza waxed fat from his jollity, while Don Quixote was built like a lath. All the heathen gods who were patrons of merriment are represented as having been stout; all those who were serious were pictured as thin.

LIKE MONEY IN BANK. The avicropolis called "adipose tissue" may be compared to the capital of a bank. Some persons live on the income and do not use up the capital, while others burn up all the capital and live as a wages-earner with little reserve.

Laughter is really related to shivers, shakes and chills. That is to say, it has a muscular setting. The smile is to the laugh what a miniature is to a large portrait. The spread from a smile to a laugh is merely the gradually extension of motion to many other muscles. The mouth opens to take a long breath. There follows short, sharp, explosive moments for the vocal muscles with the resounding "music of laughter."

When you "hold your hips" with side-splitting laughter it means almost all of the muscles of the abdomen and trunk are involved in the loud guffaws. When a child laughs it is the thrill of joyful animation shot through the little one's abundant muscles. Satisfaction is also concerned with laughter, as you may agree, if you tickle the palms, or even at times hurt the subject. Pain, hysteria, heat, cold and surprises may occasionally start laughter.
