GREAT HAS BEEN FAMILY OF MIGHTY PETER THE GREAT

Analysis of Horse Racing Proves Supremacy of This Turf King

There appeared in a recent issue of the Horse Review an interesting series of tables showing the groups of ten of the fastest trotting horses and the most prolific sires that have yet appeared, with the best records made under various ages by themselves or their offspring. These important statistics of harness racing were published without comment. To analyze them is to treat with seemingly scant consideration some once proud names in the annals of trot and stud, and to shower upon the family of Peter the Great, 2.07%, such outstanding distinction as no other horse has achieved since Hambletonian's day.

four-year-olds is still more remarkable, in that four of the ten are by Peter the Great himself, while six are his descendants in the direct male line. And what a lot they are—Peter Volo, 2.02; Peter Manning, 2.02%; Peter the Brewer, 2.02%; McGregor the Great, 2.03%; Volo, 2.03%.

When the speed test is advanced to 2.10, Peter the Great again heads the list, and by a greater margin than when the rate is 2.30. White he is credited with 138 trotters in the 2.10 list, General Watts, 2.06%, the next best horse, has only 41. San Francisco ranks third, with 28; Guy Axworthy, fourth, with 27; Axworthy fifth, with 24; Belwin, 2.06%, sixth, with 22; Dillon Axworthy seventh, with 20; McKinney, 2.11%, eighth, with 20; Zomibro, 2.11, ninth, with 19, and Etawah, 2.04, tenth, with the same number.

Dominion Boys Defeat Sweden 22-0, and Britain Wins From France

CHAMONIX, France, Jan. 30.—The hockey teams of Great Britain and Canada triumphed over the representatives of France and Sweden in the Olympic games today.

Canada's victory over Sweden has made the Canadians big favorites for the Olympic hockey championship. The Swedes never had a chance in the face of skill and speed the like of which is said never to have been seen before in the old world.

Manager Mulqueen, of the Canadians, said that his team in their present form equalled any sextette that ever took the ice, either in Canada or the United States in the history of the game.

The Canadians opened with a bewildering attack against the Swedish goal and before the period ended had found the net five times.

The victory won today was the second decisive one to be gained by the Canadians since the opening of the Olympic programme of the Olympic winter sports.
