The latest news, first of all.

The mail train arrived in this city at ten o'clock last evening.

C. D. Bell was a passenger to the city on the mail train from Summerside last evening.

The Guardian is indebted to George W. Cumming, of Brooklyn, New York, for recent copies of the Philadelphia papers which contain graphic descriptions and illustrations of the recent aviation triumph of Charles K. Hamilton who flew from New York to Philadelphia. The distance was eighty six miles and the space between the two cities was covered in one hour and fifty-one minutes.

Dr. McPhail and family of Montreal, passed through the city yesterday on their way to P. B. Island to spend the summer. Dr. McPhail, who is an eminent specialist, owns a farm on the island and every year spends a few weeks there. He has very pronounced views on the subject of farm-work done in for considerable experimental work during his stay there. Speaking to a reporter, he said the great need of the maritime provinces is more farmers and more work done on the farms. He pointed out that the farms now worked by one or two men should have at least a dozen hands. He is a firm believer in the value of experimental farms for educating the farmers. The doctor was accompanied by two very fine dachshunds, which were greatly admired.—St. John Telegraph, June 15.

DISASTROUS FLOODS.
BERNE, SWITZERLAND, June 16.—Inundations, caused by swollen streams to the eastern and southern districts of Switzerland have caused immense damage. A landslide at Altorf buried a factory building, killing a woman and ten children, employees.

Belgrade, June 16.—Floods, following torrential rains, have caused havoc among the crops and other property in the Valley of the Morava River, and 265 lives were lost. Chufpria, Jagodina and Svalainitz are inundated. Water to the depth of 7 to 10 feet has filled streets. Many houses have collapsed.

Constantinople, June 16.—Terrible floods have swept the province of Erzurum, Turkish Armenia. The town of Hassankaleh was wrecked, hundreds of persons being drowned.

HAMILTON WILL FLY UP BROADWAY.
NEW YORK, June 15.—Speaking tonight of his proposed exhibition flight for New Yorkers, Hamilton said:

"I'll guarantee to fly up Broadway from the Battery to Harlem at a height not exceeding 30 feet, except where I have to go over the 'L' or some obstruction like that. There's plenty room between the building lines of Broadway for my bi-plane and I'll make the whole trip just clearing the trolley cars. The two rivers make this city almost an ideal place in which to fly, for it isn't much of a trick to strike water when one has to, if water is only near enough at hand."

BOSTON SWELTERED IN MONDAY'S HEAT.
BOSTON, June 15.—The hottest day of the year—86 degrees at the official thermometer in the weather bureau station and 96 degrees on Washington Street in the heart of the city—came to Bostonians Monday as a change from the long period of cold weather and over seventy hours of continuous rain which had marked the month to date.

The day started in fairly warm, but with a gentle tempering breeze from the northwest, and gradually worked up to the maximum temperature of the day at 3 o'clock in the afternoon. The wind swung around to the southwest, but still kept the humidity below normal, with plenty of blue sky and sunlight.

BIG WESTERN LAWSUIT.

VICTORIA, B. C., June 15.—What promises to be the most sensational lawsuit in the history of the province comes to trial on June 27, when Henry Croft and others will bring an action against Hon. James Duns-muir and nine other defendants, claiming four and a half millions for alleged conspiracy respecting an option on lands in the E & N Railway belt. Defendants are owners of land on Cranberry, Strawberry and Oyster districts. Plaintiffs allege that they obtained from defendants options on these lands, commenced their development as coal mines, and negotiated the sale of rights. They further allege that defendants conspired in granting a second option to cloud their registration of the first in order to prevent competition in the coal production business in which they also are engaged. The defence is a denial of these allegations in toto.

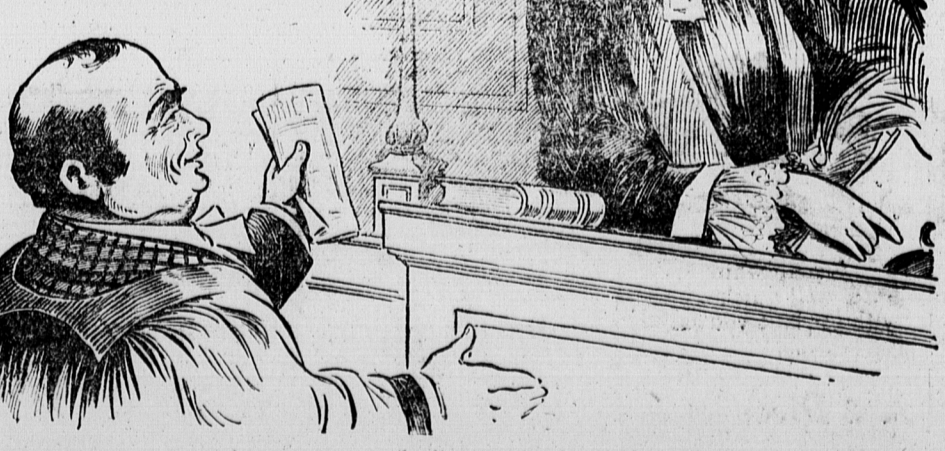
