AN ISLAND BOY'S EXPERIENCES. The following letters from the front have been received by Mr. John O'Henley, of Monticello, in this province, from his son, Daniel, who is now in action with the 24th Battery of Artillery somewhere in France.

LOST HIS TEETH. An officer at the front writes: It was an inferno, shells continually bursting; the smoke and noise, not to mention the slaughter, was dreadful. Then, to a second, every gun ceased fire, and a Guards regiment took their sign from the cessation of the artillery.

DRUGGED GERMANS. A young Frenchman writes: "The Germans began their attack upon us with their twelfth corps of Saxons, composed mainly of fresh troops. We did not think they would have the audacity to leave their trenches in full daylight, but all of a sudden we saw them advance in column formation, the first files without equipment, but with their haversacks full of grenades, which they began to hurl at us."

So now I must tell you what I think of the Old Country as much as I have seen of it. County Cork, Ireland, is handsome. I never saw any place to compete with it for scenery. It is second to heaven and the Irish people are as nice as can be, fine looking and healthy.

LETTER NO. 2.

My Dear Father—Just a short note to let you know that I am leaving for the front. Seven of us were picked out to-day. I am the only islander out of the seven, these seven being picked out of the 6th Brigade, which comprises over one thousand men. In one way I count myself lucky to be honoured so, and in another way perhaps I am unlucky, anyway we have all to meet our lot some day. I feel confident that I will return to you all safe. Since I joined the army I have in every way become a better man, and I can be sure that I conduct myself as far as good behaviour goes in a respectable way to all officers. I have never been up before an officer for any crime, and it is very few that can say that in the army, for you know that's taken up for the least little thing. Father, this will be a short note, all I ask is for you to pray for me that I may return all safe and victorious.

LETTER NO. 1.

My Dear Father—After a long weary trip at sea we arrived first in Ireland, Queenstown, County Cork. We were there one day, from there we set sail for Liverpool, arrived in Liverpool yesterday noon. We took the train from there to our destination. We are now in the barracks about twenty miles from Calais in France. You have heard tell of Captain Webb swimming Dover Strait. We are about fifty miles from Dover Strait, so you see we are in a lovely place and the best of accommodations. We are about seventy-five miles from the firing line in France. Now I must tell you something about our trip I am sure you will be interested in what I can tell you. My experiences and what I have seen. We set sail from Halifax, February 23rd. The first two days we had clear weather and a moderately calm sea. The next two days were very foggy, so thick that we could not see one end of the ship to the other. For the remainder of the trip it was very rough and quite a few were sick. I myself never minded the trip. I was not sick, but still I got tired of being rocked about on a lonesome sea, not knowing what minute we would be blown up. There were three passenger steamers together and one tug, the first from Montreal and the other hundred miles of the Irish coast. Then each steamer took a different course, so that if such a thing would happen that we would run into any floating mines or German destroyers we would not all be blown up. We had the faster steamer and I tell you very rough and quite a few were sick. Some till we got to Queenstown, and I believe we arrived there none too soon, for the enemy was not far away. On our way across we had some nice sporting games. On board there were twelve hundred troops, the 21st Battalion, 22nd, 23rd and 24th Ammunition Column from Montreal and the Mounted Rifles from the West. Each Battery was put up against one another to see which was the best in sports. There were boxing exhibitions, wrestling, tug-of-war, squadron fighting, cock fighting, pillow boxing on a pole, sack racing, three-legged racing, a lot more too numerous to mention. The steamer we were on, s.s. Meganitic gave silver cups to all the winners.

INVENTS PERISCOPE SIGHT FOR ARMY RIFLE

KINGSTON, Ont., April 3.—Captain Scott, of the 21st battalion, has invented a new periscope sight which can be attached to any rifle and used in the trenches as effectively as direct sighting of a rifle, and without exposing the user to the rifle fire of the enemy. Patents have been secured in foreign countries for the sight and its usefulness has been demonstrated in Ottawa.
