Glorious sunshine outside and a profusion of beautiful summer flowers inside made an appropriate setting for the solemn marriage ceremony, which was performed by the Rev. H. F. Newman, Rector of St. Mark's Church, Kennington. The bride, who was in a two piece dress of white crepe and carrying an arm bouquet of pink gladioli, was escorted to the altar by her father. Her attendant was her cousin, Miss Marion Howard who was dressed in pale green and carried a bouquet of sweet peas. Mr. Clifford Ramsay was the bride's best man. TERMS NOT DISCLOSED—Italy accepted all the terms imposed by the Allies. It was obliged to "comply with political, economic, and financial conditions" which will be imposed later. The surrender was announced simultaneously by Allied headquarters and by Marshal Pietro Badoglio's government, with General Eisenhower in a brief broadcast stating that "the Italian government has surrendered its armed forces unconditionally."

THE PROCLAMATION by Badoglio sent to Allied Headquarters and will "cease all acts of hostility against the Anglo-American forces wherever they may be met. They will, however, oppose attacks from any other quarter."

THE WAR ADVENTURE into which Italy was embarked by Benito Mussolini, the creator of Fascism, who himself departed last July 25, thus ended in complete and absolute defeat. But with the absolute defeat the Allies would help in freeing the country of the German yoke.

AS THE ARMISTICE was announced, British and Canadian forces of the 8th Army were already installed on the Italian top, winning their invasion hold with scant opposition.

GERMANY still has considerable forces in Italy. Italy's collapse represents the greatest victory so far scored by the United Nations in four years of the war.

News of Italy's Surrender Greeted With Rejoicing

News that Italy had capitulated was received in Charlottetown yesterday with rejoicing.

The fire bell on the City Hall rang for many minutes shortly. It continued to clang for so long that persons who had not heard the news began to make inquiries. A short time later the air raid sirens sounded a long all clear signal and church bells took up the spreading of the joyful news.

In City schools children were told of the victory and then dismissed. They ran through the streets shouting that Italy was out of the war. All over the City citizens stopped to talk and discuss the sensational development and speculate on how long or how soon the two other Axis partners would be making an unconditional surrender as well as Italy.

At H.M.S. Queen Charlotte the sailors dressed ship by hoisting the ensign to the mainmast. The ship's company was paraded in front of the barracks and a general salute was given as the ensign was hoisted.

regent to run the country following the death of King Boris. The choice undoubtedly will be sharply influenced by the news from Italy, especially during the meeting of six-year-old King Simion, the daughter of King Victor Emmanuel of Italy.

Hungary was reported taking steps to declare its capital, Budapest, an open city before Allied bombing attacks began in Rumania, as well as Bulgaria and Hungary, long has been reported desirous of negotiating for a peace.

In Yugoslavia and Greece guerrilla armies probably will be receiving Allied supplies through Adriatic ports—there is no outright Allied invasion.

Already Allied staff officers from Cairo have their way into Yugoslavia and held conferences with guerrillas to co-ordinate strategy.

In London it was expected that the news would have an immediate and important effect on negotiations for a three-power conference between Prime Minister Churchill, President Roosevelt and Premier Joseph Stalin.

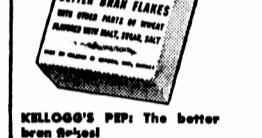
