POTATO CHOCOLATE CAKE

2-3 cup butter.
2 cups sugar.
2 eggs.
1/2 cup milk.
1 cup hot mashed potatoes.
2 cups flour.
1 teaspoon each of cloves, cinnamon and nutmeg.
1 cup grated chocolate.
2 tablespoons baking powder.
1 cup chopped walnuts.
Cream butter and sugar well. Separate the yolks of the eggs from the whites. Add the well beaten yolks and sweet milk, beat well, add the mashed potatoes and then the grated chocolate. Then add the well-sifted flour which has been mixed with the baking powder and spices; add the chopped walnuts and lastly, the stiffly beaten egg whites. Bake for one hour in a moderate oven. This cake keeps well and is very delicious.
