The following will be of interest to Island patrons of Mt Allison:—Fearing that possible patrons of our institution may be deterred by the reports current in the papers of the crowded condition of the Ladies' College, we have pleasure in assuring our readers that provisions are being made to accommodate all who are likely to apply. Carpenters are now at work partitioning off the space formerly occupied by the studio. In this way room will be obtained for additional students. This change with other readjustments contemplated will probably meet the present needs. Architects are at work upon plans for a new stone wing which will form a part of the New Ladies' College when the way is opened for the complete structure. It is expected that the plans will be ready to submit to the Board of Regents some time in January. The impression is growing that if our Ladies' College is to meet the needs of the future some change in the direction of increased and improved accommodation is imperative.

THURSDAY evening the Clyde River Presbyterian Sabbath School held their annual entertainment in the church there. There was a large attendance of children and friends notwithstanding the coldness of the night. Mr. Hugh Macmillan, New Haven, superintendent of the school, occupied the chair. After an address by the pastor Rev. J. G. McIvor, the Rev. J. R. McKay, of Souris, addressed the children, pointing out in a genial and kindly manner the need of constant attendance on the Sunday School instructions. The program comprised a number of fine recitations and some excellent selections by the choir led by Miss Cruys, Kingston, who took charge of the music in the absence of the organist. The Supt. intimated that this year again Mrs. Reid, of Chicago a former pupil of the school had kindly remembered them and sent beautiful artistic booklets with texts for a month to be given to each child. These were distributed to the children at the close with a large bag of candy to each and all left delighted with the evening's entertainment.

On Thursday evening, Jan. 3rd, a meeting was held at Kingston, for the purpose of considering the proposed site of the new bridge. Mr. W. F. Fraser was appointed to the chair, and discharged the duties of that office with satisfaction to all. Messrs. Jacob Bain, and James Howard, of North River were present, for the purpose of discussing, and supporting the new site. D. Frazer, J. Crews, N. Colwill, and others spoke in opposition to them, claiming that the increased cost would be too much to incur at the present time, also, that the present road is a much better one as there are fewer hills on it and part of it is macadamised, which would be of no benefit to the public were the proposed route adopted, and it would also destroy the shipping which is done at North River. At the close of the discussion Mr. Howard presented a petition for signatures, but without success. A counter petition was also presented, which was largely signed. The meeting was unanimous in favor of having it built at the old site, for these and other reasons to mention. Messrs. Bain and Howard, having failed to make any impression on the meeting, left the hall sadder if not wiser men. They now realize that the people of the north would be at a great disadvantage by having the bridge built at Brighton.—Com

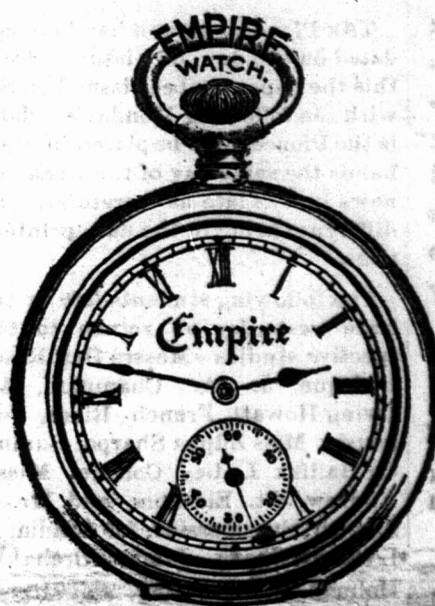
