Removal of War Trophies Urged

LONDON, Eng., Oct. 5.—The whole question of the fate of war souvenirs presented to municipalities for display in public places after the Great War, is to be raised by Councillor W. F. Castle, J. P., the mayor of Southwark, at a meeting of the Metropolitan Mayors' Association.
"Eventually," said Councillor Castle, "I hope to enlist the support of every municipality in the country with a view to doing away with these trophies. In various parts of the country, I have noticed they have been allowed to get into a state of neglect; some of them are practically falling to pieces, and people seem to take little interest in them. There is every likelihood of a movement to get rid of them altogether."
"That is not only my own impression, I have consulted Ex-Servicemen, and found that in most cases they regard them as reminders of unpleasant experiences which they would rather see buried for ever. The majority of other people share their dislike. As for the younger generation, I do not think it is good that they should have their interest awakened in war by the display of these captured guns and munitions. It prejudices the general movement towards a permanent world peace."
The War Office, however, following the war many thousands of these trophies were distributed to practically every borough in the country. They were allotted conspicuous sites on village greens, facing town halls, and in the case of Bloomsbury—immediately behind the British Museum.
Many of them have since been sold as scrap iron, and some have been summarily dumped into rivers.

Premier Bracken in Toronto

Although it has been in charge of affairs little more than a month the Government has been giving exhaustive consideration to the best means of carrying out its determination to get all the facts about the affairs of the province.

POLICE LOOKING FOR STOLEN SACRED JEWELS

PEKING, Oct. 5.—Although police and military authorities still are keeping a strict watch on the curio shops of Peking and Tientsin, they have little hope of recovering the most valuable of the treasure stolen from Imperial Manchurian tombs in the Eastern Hills, 90 Miles from Peking.

Desecration of the tombs by former Chihui-shangtung troops has dazed the Manchus and Chinese alike. Because of the general practice of ancestor worship in China, the act is considered even more reprehensible by the Chinese than it would be in the West.

Sacrificial vessels of carved jade, massive vases and incense burners of gold and silver and figures carved in rare metals and stones are among the plunder of the vandals. It is reported that a band of about 2,000 soldiers led by a subordinate general raided the tombs. The thieves will have to have great difficulty in disposing of their loot on account of the size of the objects and their immense value. Most of the treasure will probably be brot up so that the jade, gold and silver and precious stones may be recovered and sold in bulk.

Manchu treasures of great value have been disappearing almost constantly from the palaces and museums in Peking for the past seventeen years. The former servants of the Empress-Dowager and Boy Emperor are known to have taken many of these Chinese curio dealers here in the belief that a large theft occurred in 1924 when Marshal Feng Yu-shing occupied Peking. At that time, they say, an entire caravan of treasure was taken into the Northwest. If this story is true, the objects are still concealed somewhere as they have never appeared on the market in China or abroad.

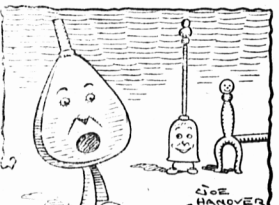

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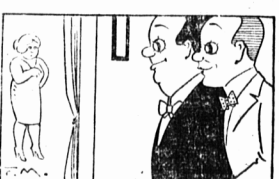
