Women Trained To Take Posts As Army Cooks

TORONTO, April 14 - (CP) - If Canada's army cooks ever run short of army cooks, they should have no difficulty finding new recruits - the recruits being women. Because they felt the urge to do something worthwhile in Canada's war effort, 40 Ontario women, backed by the Red Cross and the Canadian Auxiliary Territorial Service, took a seven-week course in "quantity cooking" at the Toronto Central Technical School. They studied and practiced seven hours a day, six days a week.

Miss E. Middleton, head teacher of the class and dietician of the school staff says the women will be ready to enter any army kitchen and do competent work after completing another two-week course in hospital kitchens receiving practical cooking experience.

"In fact," she said, "I wouldn't hesitate one moment to place any one of the girls in any army canteen right now. I know they would come up to the standards we've tried to teach."

Miss Middleton believes most of the women will find permanent jobs in army canteens across Canada. "Already, one woman has been placed in a good job," she said, "she is now night cook at a large Toronto gun-making plant."

With Army Rations

A day's classroom work consists of two lectures and experimental work in the laboratory. The students are taught fundamentals of cooking small quantities before tackling larger ones. In the "cleanliness, economy and nutrition values of different foods," and Miss Middleton points out that the women had received no previous training before taking the course.

"The majority of these girls," Miss Middleton said, "are longing for a chance to go overseas where they could be of real service. They realize of course that at the present time it is rather unlikely they will get that chance." She pointed out a number of women in a classroom, refugees from Nazi-occupied European countries.

May Be Extended

"Those women in particular," she said, "would give their right arm to go overseas right now. They have relations living in England."

Her Objectives

"My job may perhaps be best expressed as that of personnel inspector," said Mrs. Knox, who has been with the A.T.S. since it was organized. "In a large body of women like the A.T.S. there are always a number of things which suggest themselves to members as capable of being improved."

"I shall listen to everything which group commanders bring to my notice and look out for suggestions I can make myself. The object is to be to bring the A. T. S. up to what it ought to be and wants to be - in cases where it is not up to standard."

Mrs. Knox will inquire into administration, training, health and general well-being. Any proposals she thinks fit to make will be placed directly before the War Office. Feeding arrangements will come under her notice. In the matter of uniforms and other clothing, if she finds that a camp is not receiving all it needs this will be noted and reported.

If Mrs. Knox finds that any groups of women and girls are not happy in their work through causes which could be remedied by commonsense adjustment, she will see about it.

Expect Trans-Canada Air Lines Plane today

A Trans Canada Air Lines plane, scheduled to arrive here from Moncton yesterday, took over the feeder service between Charlottetown, Summerside and Moncton today was grounded at the mainland center last night because of weather conditions, it was learned. It was expected the plane will arrive early this morning in time to make the first scheduled flight from here at 7 o'clock.

Two passengers on the first flight to the mainland will be Lt. Col. G. E. Full and Mr. R. E. Mutch, both of Charlottetown and representatives from this province on the maritime transportation commission. A meeting of the commission is slated for Moncton today.

The flight, which was to have been the last scheduled flight by Canadian Airways in the feeder service between here and the mainland was cancelled because of fog and rain.

Flights to and from here were made earlier in the day but weather conditions became worse towards evening.

Canadian Airways is discontinuing here after more than ten years service. In addition to the Charlottetown, Summerside and Moncton route, air mail and passenger flights were made from time to time in the winter between Charlottetown and the Magdalen Islands. It began some years after the flight of the Moncton-Charlottetown run.

British A. T. S. To Get Benefit of "Ideas Woman"

LONDON, April 14 - (CP) - Gen. Sir Commandant Jean Knox, appointed to the new post of "ideas woman" of the Auxiliary Territorial Service, is touring Britain to see whether any changes should be made to improve conditions of service and make the A.T.S. more useful.

The War Office announcement that the pretty, 30-year-old brunette had been appointed inspector said the post was created because of the increasing size of the A.T.S. and the new duties which it may be required to undertake.

Inspector Knox, whose husband is a Royal Air Force squadron leader, is touring Britain to see whether any changes should be made to improve conditions of service and make the A.T.S. more useful.

As a member of the A. T. S. directorate, she will have a general view of the A.T.S. and will be that of a controller and, as inspector, she will have direct access to the Joint Parliamentary Under-Secretary of State who is a member of the War Council responsible for all questions of policy relating to the A. T. S.

Montreal team Looks good for Baseball season

MONTEAL, April 14 - (CP) - After two hard seasons, Montreal fans are yelling for a first-division club in the International League and if Manager Clyde Sukeforth's plans work out, they may have just the team to lead the league.

The Royals spent a lot of time down in Macon, Ga., without giving out much of a hint as to what the eventual lineup might be, but they suddenly began to take definite shape when they hit the barnstorming trail that will wind up in the city of Montreal this season.

The team as it now stands is a mixture of the best of the squad that ended in fifth place last season and a number of promising newcomers.

Another newcomer to the outfield is Woody Jensen, who held down the centrefield job for Jersey City Giants last season. The other regular fielding berth goes to the Royals' first baseman, George Slaughter, slugging star of last year's team.

That gives the squad two potential hitters in the outfield, and a tower of defensive strength at centre field. The utility outfielder probably will be Charlie Gilbert, who was with the club last season. Gilbert has been looking fine in spring efforts and it might turn out that he will win the centre job and Jensen end up as utility.

The infield looks good on paper, too. Little Sammy Bell will be back, probably not seeing action, but in his life is enough to make a large section of Montreal fandom happy, to say nothing of giving the Royals another probable 300 hits.

The rest of the infield is new. Claude Corbett, for whom Royals traded three players to Milwaukee, will be at short, with Johnny Eudowood from Brooklyn at first base, and Jack Graham, traded to the Royals by New York, is the probable choice for first, replacing Gus Suhr who went to Milwaukee as part payment for Corbett.

Roy Hughes, who had a lot of bad luck last season but appears to be back in stride now, is the likely choice for utility inder.

The catching staff is the same as last year, which means it's adequate defensively if not particularly brilliant on the attack. Angelo Ghilani and Joe Becker will alternate behind the plate. Both are fair hitters, although neither is a powerhouse. Ghilani particularly has a knack of delivering with runners on base.

All of which leaves only the pitching as the question mark - and the pitching is usually the question mark with the Royals. There's the backbone of a really grand hurling staff though in the return of Max Macon and Steve Rachunok and the purchase of Roxie Lawson from St. Louis Browns and Pep Rambert from Buffalo. A few more like that, foursome and the Montrealers would be set.
