U. M. W. Hold Heated Session

NEW GLASGOW, N. S., April 20.—With eight delegates on their feet, attempting to address the chair, in the midst of a general uproar, the second day's sitting of the special United Mine Workers of America convention was adjourned abruptly here yesterday afternoon by District President D. W. Morrison.

The specific purpose for which the convention had been called, that of discussing the situation that has arisen as a result of the reputation by the membership of the wage decreases recommended by the Duncan Commission and endorsed by the district executive, had yet to be faced.

The proceedings were largely taken up with a discussion as to whether or not five members of the Mine Workers Union of Canada, headed by Dan Livingstone, deposed district president of the U. M. W., should be seated as fraternal delegates. But the highlights of the day were the upholding of President Morrison, in his capacity as chairman of the meeting, by a roll call vote, 79 to 57 and the intimation, late in the day, by Howard Tatteree of Springfield, that unless the delegates got down to business, he and those delegates who wished to carry on under the banner of the U. M. W. were prepared to withdraw and complete the agenda before the convention.

Arthur Petrie declared that no fraternity exists as between the U. M. W. and the Mine Workers Union and Angus F. Macdonald charged that the latter organization was allied with the Third International.

Those who spoke in favor of seating representatives of the Mine Workers Union were: William C. Carey, of Florence; John R. Macdonald, of Victoria; J. A. Macdonald, of Phelan; Murdoch Wilson, of Stellarton; Mickey Martin, of Aberdeen.

MISS JOHANNA SHEA

Miss Johanna Shea, after an illness that extended through a period of only a few days, died at her home in Indian River on Thursday, April 14. She had enjoyed health for years, and her death was not anticipated.

Her funeral was held on Saturday morning to St. Mary's, Indian River, and the procession reached from the home to the church. The pall bearers were: Simon Wilbert Delaney, Orville Clarke, John T. Murphy, Edward Easter, Gervase McLellan and Fred Tuplin. High Mass of Requiem was sung by the Pastor, Rev. Reginald McDonald, who also performed the solemn Obsequies. The choir rendered the choral part in a manner fitting to the solemn event.

Numerous Mass intentions were placed upon the casket. To mourn are left three sisters, Mrs. A. M. Bent, Summerside; Miss Emma Shea, Boston, Mass., and Mrs. Wm. Tobin, Boston, Mass.

The deceased was a daughter of the late Francis Shea and his wife Margaret Ellen Cocharan, the former having come from Ireland in the early historic days of Indian River. She was born in 1855 in the old homestead on the Irishtown Road, near the location of the Traditional Inn, still treasured in memory as "The Black House." Here she lived until about sixty years ago, when the family moved to Indian River. Through her life she maintained a spirit of practical, sociable womanhood. She was most popular with all her neighbors and friends, which was but an adequate recognition of her superior womanhood. There was not a selfish element in her nature, and she envisioned the comfort of others before her own. Naturally, she was reflective, and her conversation, therefore, was ever interesting and substantial. Treasured in mind will endure the memory of an ideal Christian woman. Requiescat in pace.—Y.
