Goes To Guiana

CRUISER CALCUTTA WILL TAKE HIM OVER ENTRANCE BAR

PORT OF SPAIN, Trinidad, Sept. 21.—H. M. S. Renown, with the Prince of Wales on board, arrived here yesterday morning and anchored among the gaily-decorated shipping in the harbor. The Renown was escorted from Colon by the cruiser Calcutta, and was joined at Boca del Toro by the cruiser at Calloupe.

Gets Great Ovation

A tremendous ovation was given the Prince and his suite upon their landing at 11 o'clock. They were met by the Governor, officials and leading residents with a guard of honor, composed of the Royal Sussex Regiment, stationed here, marines from the Calcutta and Calloupe, the local constabulary, and a group of men who fought in the Great War.

Addresses of welcome were made on behalf of the Government and municipal authorities, to which the Prince replied.

An illuminated address presented by the municipal authorities, was the work of a French nun of a local convent, and was enclosed in a casket made by returned soldiers of the island's woods.

Amid dense enthusiastic crowds the Prince drove through the principal streets to St. Joseph, the old Spanish capital. On his return to Port of Spain he addressed thousands of school children and then had luncheon at the Governor's Palace.

There was a reception at the Government house in the afternoon, followed by an official dinner and a public ball in a building constructed for King George years ago.

Magnificent decorations were to be seen everywhere. Last night there was an extensive fireworks display.

At the Prince's request, no official engagements have been made for the concluding two days of his visit, leaving him free to make and renew acquaintances.

On Monday the Prince will leave for Demerara, British Guiana, on the Calcutta, the Renown being unable to cross the bar there. He will return to Trinidad on the evening of the 23rd and start immediately for Grenada, West Indies.

The Health Span

How many years of really robust health do you suppose the average person has in the course of his or her lifetime?

At a rough guess you would perhaps say forty. Or, to be on the safe side and avoid overestimating, you might more cautiously put the health span at thirty or twenty-five years.

You would hardly go lower than that. Surely, you would argue, nearly everybody must have at least twenty-five years of freedom from health impairment. Many, you will add, certainly have more than that.

Many certainly do. Yet medical men who have most closely delved into health statistics insist that, in our modern civilized world, so many have less than twenty-five years of full health that the average health span is only ten years! That seems incredible to you. Nevertheless, it is possible to gather from numerous sources as appalling array of evidence to support this seemingly incredible statement.

The world war, for one thing, revealed a disheartening extent of ill health even among the naturally most vigorous element in the population—young men in their twenties.

Recall that of 2,500,000 of these examined for service in the United States army more than one-third had to be rejected as unfit to bear arms because of physical defects. And correlate with this some astonishing facts brought to light by health examinations for insurance and other purposes.

As, for example, to quote Fisher and Fleck:

"Among large groups of clerks and employees of bank and commercial houses in New York City, with an average age of twenty-seven and all supposedly picked men and women, none were found free of impairment or of habits of living inviting impairment. Of those with important physical impairments 89 per cent. were, prior to the examination, unaware of impairment."

And in millions of instances impairment of health begins exceedingly early. According to Dr. Fredrick Peterson, a New York physician of prominence and known to be cautiously conservative in statement:

"More than 16,000,000 children of our 22,000,000 now in the public schools have physical defects, most of them preventable and remediable, such as heart and lung diseases, disorders of sight and hearing, diseased adenoids and tonsils, flat feet, weak spines, imperfect teeth, and malnutrition."

Note especially the phrase, "physical defects, most of them preventable and remediable." If the average span of health today is only ten years, it is not thus short because of conditions inherent in modern civilization. These, no doubt, stress humanity as was not the case in earlier and simpler times.

But the great cause of the deplorably short health span is the failure of people to take the trouble to learn how to live hygienically. Ignorance is to blame more than any other single cause.

And until people begin to educate themselves for health as zealously as they now educate themselves for the earning of a living there can be no appreciable lengthening of the average health span.

Popular education in the ways of right living, together with popular application of the rules for right living, is assuredly one of the greatest needs of our time.
