GERMAN OFFICER COUSIN OF BRITISH ADMIRAL.

LONDON, April 1.—The long arm of coincidence is curiously exemplified in an incident of the battle of the Falkland Islands which is just brought to light in The Cornhill Magazine. An officer of H. M. S. Carnarvon, which took part in that engagement and flew the flag of Admiral Stoddart, was in command of the cutters which rescued some of the German men. Describing the operation, this officer wrote: 'One of the German officers saved was a first cousin of our Admiral Stoddart. He was in a 2-turret and a second torpedo officer. The turret was knocked out and he was the sole survivor. He then went to a classmate gun, which was also knocked out and practically all the crew killed. He went to a third classmate, which was also knocked out, and he was again practically the sole survivor. He went to another gun and the ship was then sunk. He remained in the water for nearly one and a quarter hours and was picked up.'

NICHOLAS POWER HONORED EX-CHIEF RECEIVED KING'S MEDAL

HALIFAX, April 1.—Certainly Nicholas Power had occasion for deep gratification in the circumstances in connection with the presentation to him today in the legislative council chamber by His Honor Lieutenant-Governor McGregor, of the King's coveted 'Police Medal.'

The council chamber was crowded to the doors with men prominent in many walks of life. There were present three judges of the supreme court, representatives of the city government, including Mayor Blight, members of the legislature, a host of 'private citizens,' and a large representation from the Halifax police force.

Premier Murray presented the ex-chief to the lieutenant-governor, who, after a brief but happy address, in which he paid cordial tribute to Mr. Power's splendid character, pinned the medal on his coat amid applause.

Mr. Power's speech in acknowledgement was simplicity itself and was marked by genuine earnestness. There followed fine tributes to his unique official career and qualities as a man by Justice Longley, Mr. Justice Drysdale, Mr. Justice Ritchie, Mayor Blight and Premier Murray, after which the chamber resounded with cheers for Power.

It is understood that the change will take place on Sunday, May 2nd.

ENFORCE OLD FRENCH LAW IN BELGIUM.

PARIS, April 3.—The German governor general of Belgium has created special tribunals in each province, whose duty it will be to enforce the old French law, passed in the fourth year of the Republic and which holds each community responsible for damage done during public disturbances, according to a Geneva despatch to the Matin.

The German officials contend, it is reported, that this law never was repealed in the territory which now comprises Belgium, after it ceased to be a part of France, to which it was annexed in the wars of the Revolution. The Matin's correspondent says no appeal can be taken from the decisions of these tribunals.

Toronto, Ont., March 31, 1915. The season for receiving the better grade of furs is rapidly growing to a close, and spring, rubbed and shaggy skins are making their appearance. Practically all kinds of furs except muskrats, beaver and bear rapidly deteriorate in quality as the warm weather approaches, and the prices paid for goods of this class are always lower than those paid for seasonable, well-furred stock. Manufacturers are sending out their samples, but the orders received are on a very conservative basis, and the majority of manufacturers are simply buying on a hand to mouth basis.

BEEFHIDES—The market on beefhides had been pushed up, until the prices paid were nearly double those of a few weeks ago, and higher than have been paid for similar stock for a generation, but the demand for leather fell off, large quantities were dumped on the American market causing a decided slump in prices, leaving the hide market in a very unsettled condition. At the present time the views of tanners and dealers are from 1 to 2 cents per pound apart, and a still further decline in the near future would not be surprising. City butcher hides, flat, 15c per lb. Country hides, flat, cured, 14c to 15c per lb. Part cured, 13c to 14c per lb. Green, 12c to 13c.

CALFSKINS—Everything that has been said about beefhides applies with equal force to calfskins, the market on this article is weak, and stocks are accumulating. City skins, green, flat, 16c. Country, cured, 16c to 17c each. Part cured, 15c, according to condition and take off. Deacons or Bob Cat, 6c to \$1.

HORSEHIDES are also sharing in the decline, and are being marketed freely. City take off \$4 to \$4.50. Country take off No. 1, \$3.75 to \$4.25; No. 2, \$2.25 to \$3.00.

SHEEPSKINS continue firm, and are being marketed at full quotations. City Sheepskins, \$1.75 to \$2.75 each. Country sheepskins, 75c. to \$2.25.
