It is evident that somebody is making it his business to keep the farmers at it. The letters appear to run in waves, or at least the indignation causing them does. At some stages of the inundation the bulk of them come from west of the Mississippi. Again they hail from the eastern extremity of the country. At other times they emanate from the region of the Great Lakes, and occasionally there is a flood from the Ohio valley. Judging from this peculiarity, it is thought men are travelling about the country engaged in urging the farmers to keep writing. This is indicated by the unevenness of the epistolary discharge, and by the fact that each wave of letters has characteristics denoting that the same person or the same appeal or argument caused them to be written. Where the money to keep the propaganda comes from is fairly indicated by the panic into which the proposed reciprocity has thrown certain of the highly protected industries of the country. Especially is this true of the woollen, cotton and steel industries. But it is true, also, of all the beneficiaries of high protection. The American Protective Tariff League, the national organization of the protected industries, is sending out bulletins of literature against reciprocity. In this the cotton mills and steel industries frankly acknowledge their apprehension that if this agreement goes through, it will mark the beginning of the end of their control of this market which has brought them such fabulous profit.

HALIFAX AND JAMAICA THE CANADIAN MAILS.

OTTAWA, April 18—The Department of Trade has called for tenders for the mail service between Canada and Jamaica from Halifax (with call at St. John each trip) to Kingston, Ja. Tenders may be for either 14, 10 or 7 days. Vessels must be British register, and preference is given to ships which possess cold storage.

IMPORTANT BATTLE FOUGHT YESTERDAY.

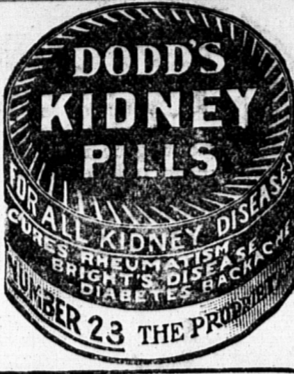
AGUA, Prieta, April 18—The most important battle of the Mexican Revolution, thus far, was fought here yesterday between 1,600 federals and

1,000 rebels, and resulted in the re-prise of the former. The battle lasted until sun-down. At nightfall two federal machine guns were in possession of the rebels and the federals had sustained 200 killed and wounded. The rebel loss was 20. From the beginning of the battle, regardless of the warning given by the United States to leaders of both forces, a rain of bullets poured into

the American town of Douglas, Ariz., and seven non-combatants residents of that city were wounded. DEATH OF JOHN McDONALD. The late John MacDonald was born in Tracaine, P. E. Island, May 15th, 1819. He emigrated to East Boston in 1873 where he lived for many years and where his wife died in 1887. After her death he lived with

different members of his family but for the last eighteen years made his home with his son-in-law George Henry, residing in East Boston and Belmont and recently in Everett. While one a visit to his sons at 132 Winthrop St. Medford Hillside, Mass. he died on April 8th., 1911, aged ninety-one years and ten months and twenty-two days.
