RETURNS FROM CUBA—Mr. H. J. Phillips of this city, returned home last week from a three months trip to Havana, Cuba, where he went to oversee the disposal of a cargo of 35,000 bushels of potatoes, shipped on the Canadian Sapper last fall by Messrs. R. E. March, Nelson Rattenbury and himself. There was also a shipment of 5,000 bushels sent down on the same boat by Bellis Bros. Mr. Phillips, who went to Cuba representing that firm, is expected home this week. Mr. Phillips says that the island potatoes were all sold, but that the market was dull when he left there. A considerable quantity of potatoes had been received from New Brunswick and Europe. It is difficult to make a forecast of the prospects for this spring. The demand in Cuba is mainly for white potatoes, preferably Green Mountains. There is apparently no demand for Island seed potatoes. Mr. Phillips took a number of trips into the interior where he visited sugar plantations, where he met a number of Islanders including Theophilus McLeod, of Orwell and Lou Paul of Charlotte town, the latter being in that country for his health, and steadily gaining strength.

Mexican Deputies In Political Feud

MEXICO CITY, Feb. 20—Three men were killed and one wounded in a series of connected shootings at Pueblo yesterday, the affair arising out of the bitter existing feud between the state government and independent political factions.

Antonio Moro, independent deputy, was shot and wounded by Trinquillo Alonzo, a government adherent, after a dispute in the main plaza of the city, over the election of a new board of directors of the Chamber of Deputies, set for today.

Senator Moro's brother, hearing of the affair, sought out Alonzo and shot and killed him. Arturo Carrillo, inspector of the police, learned of the shootings, and led a squad to the residence of the Moro brothers. When the police attempted to enter, another altercation arose, shots were exchanged, and Alonzo and Fernando Moro were both killed. Rivals were made on residences of other independent deputies, but there were no further casualties.

Friction between the state government, headed by Governor Jose Maria Sanchez, and the independent factions has existed for some time, the governor on several occasions threatening forcibly to adjourn the Chamber unless an agreement was reached.

Governor Sanchez is charged by his opponents with radical sentiments, which they say have been incorporated in certain laws passed by the state legislature, to which the more conservative factions, composed largely of Catholics, have voiced objection.
