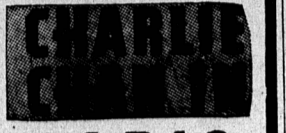

# Ontario Govt. Receives Power Memorandum

(C. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) TORONTO, April 24.—The Ontario Government has received a memorandum from the Hydro-Electric Power Commission stating how much Quebec power would be required by the province but it arrived too late to be considered by today's lengthy session of Cabinet. Premier Mitchell Hepburn announced tonight. Conferences with companies affected by the government legislation to terminate power purchase contracts are slated for next week. The bill providing for cancellation has not yet been proclaimed by Lieutenant-Governor Herbert A. Bruce and this will not be done before the conferences.

# Soy Beans On Scientific Pedestal

By Guardian's Special Wire) NEW YORK, April 25.—(A.P.)—The full story of the "better babies hormone," progestin, which you can get from soy beans if necessary, was issued by the American Chemical Society tonight. It was given out that when a 30-year-old chemist, Dr. Willard M. Allen, University of Rochester, was given for his share in the achievement \$1000 in cash and a medal, the first Eli Lilly and Company award in biological chemistry. Progestin is a reproduction hormone, necessary to expectant mothers. It is a chemical normally produced by the human body. It can also be obtained from animals, and when a mother lacks it, the animal substitute is effective. Dr. Allen and Dr. O. Wintersteiner of Columbia University isolated this better babies hormone in pure crystalline form from female pigs. Simultaneously with this feat, Prof. Adolf Butenandt of Danzig and Dr. K. H. Slotta of Breslau got the pure substance in other ways. Butenandt's source was soy beans. He extracted the wax from the beans. From this he recreated, artificially by chemical synthesis, the identical hormone that the human body manufactures for its mothers.

This puts soy beans on a scientific pedestal. They used to be just forage. Shortly before their usefulness for babies was learned, the beans were turned into automobile lacquer, imitation agate for ornaments and into steering wheel handles. Lacking this hormone pregnancies are impossible. It is known that the hormone is also important in the early pre-natal development of the baby.

# Prairies Need Balanced Production

HALIFAX, April 25.—(C.P.)—The prairie farmer could solve his difficulties partially by balancing grain production so that more animal feed would be produced. M. A. MacPherson, former Provincial Treasurer and Attorney-General of Saskatchewan, declared before the Canadian Club here that the market for Canadian bacon in the United Kingdom, the speaker said, held the solution. Pork could be finished in the Maritimes, Quebec and Ontario, by the use of western grain. He urged that both east and west get together to try to bring the right rates to a level where the plan would be practicable. "Our problems are your problems, and we can best solve them together," said Mr. MacPherson, a native of Grand Anse, N.S.

# FISHERMAN'S NARROW ESCAPE

YARMOUTH, N.S., April 25.—(C.P.)—Joseph Cotreau, 30-year old fisherman, owes his life to the quickness with which he seized a line dragging over the edge of the auxiliary schooner Ruth Crowell on her return trip to Yarmouth. Members of the crew told the story today. Captain William Atkins had ordered Cotreau to fix a peak halyard and while he was at work a spar snapped, and the fisherman was plunged into the water.

# Is Charged With Murder

SHERBROOKE, Que., April 25.—(C.P.)—Formal charge of murder was read in police court here today to Lucien "Red" Morin, 26, of Barnston, Que., one of two young men found criminally responsible by a coroner's jury for the death of Willis Keith Baldwin, 78, former member of Parliament. Mr. Baldwin died last Thursday from a triple fracture of the skull suffered when he was beaten and robbed in his general store at Baldwin's mills, 30 miles from Sherbrooke. The jury, which sat at Oatlook yesterday, found Morin and Kenneth Brown, 30, now held at St. Albans, Vt., on \$5,000 bail in connection with a theft charge, criminally responsible for the wealthy businessman's death. Extradition proceedings against Brown are continuing.

# ICE DISAPPEARING OFF GRAND BANKS

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld., April 25.—(C.P. Cable)—Ice is disappearing from the Grand Banks, the United States coastguard cutter General Greene reported today on returning from a fortnight on international ice patrol. Officers of the cutter reported they sighted very little field ice and only a few bergs.

# INSURANCE BILL GOES INTO EFFECT

Y., April 25.—Hailing it as "the most progressive and enlightened piece of social legislation in many decades," Governor Herbert Lehman today signed the New York State unemployment insurance bill. The measure will become effective March 1, 1936, and first benefits will be available to workers in 1938.

# Police Action In Strike Protested

By Guardian's Special Wire) TORONTO, April 24.—Welcomed by 150 members of the Young Farmers League, bearing several banners protesting the action of police in the strike at Crowland, near Welland, 40 strikers' children arrived in Toronto today. After being fed, they were taken to homes of workers. The truck which left Welland today, carried banners reading "Hungry Crowland children to be fed by Toronto workers" and "In Crowland we asked for bread, they gave us gas bombs."

# Will Royally Celebrate Jubilee

KINGSTON, Jamaica, April 25.—(C.P. Cable)—The Jamaica Legislature voted \$2,500 (approximately \$12,150) today for expenditure in connection with celebration of the King's Silver Jubilee while a special central celebration committee pushed plans for the occasion. May 6 will be a public holiday. The Mayor of Kingston issued an appeal for further funds for a permanent national memorial. Proposals include scholarships in various parishes, affording deserving children the benefit of secondary education; a central tuberculosis hospital and new parliament buildings.

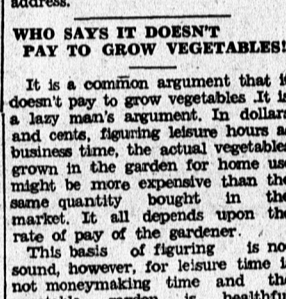
# MacDonald College Closes

TRURO, N.S., April 25.—(C.P.)—Dr. W. H. Brittain, Dean of the College of Agriculture at MacDonald College, Quebec, was the chief speaker at the closing exercises of the Nova Scotia Agricultural College. He spoke highly of the college's graduates who had passed through MacDonald, declaring many had attained leading places in the sphere of scientific farming and as in community life. Arthur G. Welch of Port Dufferin, N.S., was awarded the Governor-General's medal for highest aggregate and the MacDonald scholarship for the highest average during the year. Desmond D. Dolan of Reylands, N.B., delivered the valedictory address.

Sweet corn, peas and lettuce are never at their best quality except when used within an hour or so of being gathered from the garden, particularly corn and peas.
