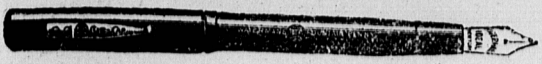

Several summonses against citizens are being issued for violation of the by-law bearing on the removal of snow from sidewalks in front of their residences or places of business. It is the intention of the authorities to insist on a rigid enforcement of his by-law, during the coming winter months, and it is certain that in doing this the comfort of the many pedestrians in this city, who up to the present have been denied the luxury of street cars, is not being neglected.

In one of the latest Consular Reports there is an article by the American Consul, Mr Deumeyer, on "Sea feeds." He has been making a study of the possibilities of obtaining Sea feed in this Province for the American Market. Last Autumn some fishermen from New Brunswick dried and pressed sea weed on these shores and shipped it to the American Market netting \$7.00 a ton. As there is very large supply around the shores it would seem that this might yet be made a profitable industry.

There are in the Province at present several buyers of hides from the United States. Through conservation with one of them it is learned that Prince Edward Island hides are regarded in the United States as the best that come from Canada, on account of their close texture and toughness. Sufficient care however, is not used in the removing of them from the animals, as a large percentage of them show cuts and holes, by reason of which they are classed as "seconds" and bring a lower price. The price of hides has been going up for some time and is likely to go still higher, it would be to the advantage of the farmers to be more careful, as the hide of the animal is frequently of considerable value and the difference in the price of "first and seconds" would very often pay the price of slaughtering by a local butcher.
