Proceedings in The Legislature

Continued From Page One

A. E. ARSENAULT said he would like to see one piece of road in the country. He asked if the government could not grant one day a week of freedom from the auto in order to enable the women to drive into the city.

HON. W. M. LEA also approved the principle of good roads showing that the value of farms would be greatly enhanced. He always held that the country that was doing things on the cheap was impoverished. Those countries which made the most generous outlays on public improvements were always the most prosperous.

Replying to a question by Hon. A. E. ARSENAULT, the commissioner of Public Works intimated that two of the projects in contemplation were in the city of Charlottetown, that the Federal grant would cover 40 per cent and the city 60 per cent.

A number of other items were discussed at considerable length, the audience which was fairly large, enjoying and possibly inspiring much of the oratory indulged in.

HON. J. H. BELL brought the proceedings abruptly to a close by moving that the speaker take the chair—and the committee report progress, leaving several items to be taken up later.

On motion of Hon. J. H. Bell the House went into committee for reconsideration of the Amusement Tax Act.

HON. J. H. BELL explained that since the passage of the Act he had received some information which led him to believe that the tax agreed upon was too high and he wanted the scale of taxes reconsidered. He thought it would be best to leave the whole matter of taxes to the discretion of the Governor in Council.

HON. J. H. JOHNSTON said he was not in the House when the scale was agreed upon but on seeing the scale of taxes proposed he made enquiries and discovered that if exacted the total tax would amount to \$8000 a year for one Charlottetown theatre alone. He moved that the tax be placed at one cent for every admission to a theatre. This was carried. Another amendment provided that the Governor in Council may exclude any class of amusement from the operations of the Act. The whole bill was reported agreed to and ordered to be read a third time tomorrow.

On motion of Mr. A. C. SAUNDERS an Act to amend the statute law was read a second time and the House went into committee with Mr. LePage in the chair for consideration of same.

The bill occupied the time until 12:45. Mr. E. T. Higgs registering many objections to the wording, the integrity and the general character of the Act and demanding many explanations from the legal fraternity.

This precipitated a somewhat heated discussion between Mr. Higgs and Hon. W. M. LEA, the latter objecting to the contentious interruptions by Mr. Higgs who, he declared, wasted more time than any other member in the House. The members, he said, were anxious to get through by tomorrow.

Mr. Higgs retorted that Mr. Lea had himself wasted much valuable time in discussing scrub bills and he, Mr. Higgs could see no reason why he had not as much right to discuss legal questions as Mr. Lea had to discuss scrub bills.

The bill was finally agreed to and ordered to be read a third time tomorrow.

House adjourned till 10 a. m. MAY 21.

MORNING SESSION
House met at 12 o'clock.

HON. G. E. HUGHES moved an amendment to the bill incorporating the O'Leary Dairying Company striking out the word 40 and substituting 30.

The following bills were read a third time and passed:—

"An Act respecting the law of partnership.

An Act to incorporate the Pre-bytory of P. E. Island in connection with the Church of Scotland.

An Act to amend an Act incorporating the Prince Edward Island Sheep Breeders Association.

An Act to empower the society for the Propagation of the Gospel in foreign parts to sell lands in several townships in the Province of Prince Edward Island.

An Act to amend the Summerside Incorporation Act, 1903.

An Act to amend an Act relating to lunatics and the care of lunatics.

An Act to incorporate the P. E. Island Veterinary Association.

MR. BRODIE moved that this bill be read this day six months hence seconded by Hon. W. M. LEA. The amendment was defeated 12 to 4.

An Act to amend the statute law.

HON. MR. BELL read a letter from the Great War Veterans Association conveying the thanks of having granted them the exemptions asked for.

House went into committee on the papers scales with Mr. Mac Arthur in the chair.

House took recess at 1 o'clock.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

House met at 4 p. m.

House in committee resumed consideration of supply, Mr. Mac Arthur in the chair.

HON. J. H. BELL introduced a resolution urging upon the Dominion Government the standardization of the remainder of the P. E. Island Railway and the providing of a second car ferry.

HON. A. E. ARSENAULT in seconding the resolution remarked that if the resolution had been introduced during the early part of the session before the estimates and supplementary estimates were brought down it might have been of some use. As it was it was too late for the present session.

The resolution was carried unanimously.

The speaker read a message from His Honor the Lieutenant Governor giving permission to introduce a bill enacting an Act respecting Public Servants as members of the Legislative Assembly.

The bill was read a first time, then a second time and ordered for consideration of a committee of the whole House with Mr. Peter Brodie in the chair.

MR. PETER BRODIE objected to taking the bill in committee in the House during the full session and had never been asked to take the chair in committee before. He was opposed to the present bill and intended to speak on it.

Mr. E. T. Higgs was then asked to take the chair which he did.

The bill provided for an increase of salary to \$2000 each for the Premier, the Attorney General, the Commissioner of Public Works and also the Commissioner of Agriculture and also for \$500 sessional indemnity to each of the members.

HON. J. H. BELL explained the necessity for the stipulated increases.

HON. A. E. ARSENAULT said that he would probably be expected to vote against this measure but he did not purpose doing so. In all honesty he considered the salaries proposed were not more than they ought to be. It was ridiculous he said that men should be expected to give their services at an expense and a sacrifice to themselves. Speaking from his own experience as Premier and Attorney General with a salary of \$2,700 he filled the joint offices at a loss to himself of a thousand dollars a year. If he had not had private resources he could not have done it.

While not objecting to the reasonable allowance now demanded it would have come with more grace from members of the government if they had not pursued the course they did last year when their whole cry was that officials were over paid, and their salaries should be reduced. He was pleased to know that they now realized the mistakes of their past and that the late government was pursuing the proper course. Although consenting to the proposed increases he must not be misunderstood as going back on his attitude towards the taxation Act. He still believed that the act was no necessary and that the higher salaries could be paid without resorting to extreme taxation. He might have made political capital out of this matter, had he so chosen, but he wanted to be honest with himself and the House.

MR. A. C. SAUNDERS followed. He had known Mr. Arsenault for many years and been associated with him both in public business and private enterprise and he had found him undeviatingly conscientious in everything he did. It was

much to his credit, and it was characteristic of him that in a matter of this kind when he could have made political capital out of it he adhered to his honest convictions.

MR. J. D. STEWART, to whom the bill was a complete surprise, humorously remarked that the government omitted to include the leader of the opposition in their salary proposals.

HON. J. H. BELL remarked that Mr. Stewart had taken the words out of his mouth. He was about to speak along that line and he believed he was not giving away any secrets when he said that the whole government and the supporters of the government, in appreciation of the services rendered by the leader of the opposition during the session, had asked the leader of the opposition to accept \$1000, which the government was prepared to give him. This Mr. Arsenault refused to accept. The offer was still open, he said, and it was the hope of the government and their supporters that he would see his way clear to accept it.

HON. J. JOHNSON followed. He highly complimented the leader of the opposition upon the valuable and unselfish services rendered by him during the session. He moved that the sum of \$1000 be appropriated as the salary of the leader of the opposition.

HON. A. E. ARSENAULT modestly acknowledged the kind references made to him by the gentlemen who had just spoken but his decision was final. His refusal however was personal merely and not binding upon his successor.

MR. PETER BRODIE objected strenuously to the additional salaries proposed. It would be an everlasting disgrace to the Liberal party. They had come into power on the distinct promise that they were going to reduce expenses and here they were putting their hands into the pockets of the people and stealing \$500 each.

MR. JAMES A. McNEILL justified the salaries proposed. He had been Commissioner of Public Works for a number of years and his successor, the Hon. Mr. Crossby, would find that if he harrowed where he, Mr. McNeill had plowed, he would find his increased salary would not let him out clear.

The bill was agreed to, given a third reading and passed also a supplementary estimate passed to

cover the additional expenditure of \$11,300.

The usual message from His Honor the Lieutenant Governor for an appropriation for the Public Service was read and acted upon by the Appropriation Act being given the necessary readings and passed. The House adjourned to meet at 8 p. m.

EVENING SESSION

House met at 9:15.

The following bills were given third reading and passed:—

The Amusement Tax Act.

An Act respecting contracts.

An Act to amend An Act respecting succession duties.

An Act provide for the issue of Debentures for payment of Bank overdraft.

An Act to amend the Chancery Act 1910 and amendments thereof.

An Act to incorporate the O'Leary Dairying Co. Ltd.

On motion of Hon. J. H. Bell an Act to vest Government House property in the Province of Prince Edward Island was read a second time and the House went into committee for consideration of the same with Mr. D. C. McDonald in the chair.

The bill was agreed to read a third time and passed.

HON. J. H. BELL announced that the work of the session had been completed and that His Honor the Lieutenant Governor would be pleased to attend tomorrow morning at 11 o'clock to prorogue the House.

PEAK OF HIGH PRICES FOR WOOL HAS PASSED

BOSTON, May 20.—The price of Australian wool slumped today, a break of from ten to twenty per cent occurring at the auction sales conducted here under the auspices of the British Government. Only seven mills took part in the bidding and but thirty per cent of the wool offered for sale was disposed of. Buyers were agreed that the peak of high prices for wools had passed.

The sales at which today's break in prices occurred were the first of a two days' auction, the first to be conducted in the United States by the British Government and announced as the last. The average prices were from ten to twenty per cent below those of the last British sales.
