## NO CHANGE IN IMMIGRATION REGULATIONS

### Hon. Mr. Gordon Denies That Restrictions Are Being Relaxed.

TORONTO, Sept. 23.—There has been no letting down of bars, no relaxing of the restrictions as to the kind of immigrant that may enter Canada in favor of the railway companies," said Hon. G. N. Gordon, Minister of Immigration and Colonization in the Dominion Government. "All that has been done is to arrive at an understanding that will do away with a good deal of red tape, which the railway companies claim has been retarding immigration to Canada."

Mr. Gordon made this statement when his attention was drawn to a report that President E. W. Beatty, of the Canadian Pacific Railway, had stated in the course of a recent speech "that the settlement of the West would proceed more rapidly now, under a new agreement with the federal government, whereby the C. P. R. and C. N. R. have been given a free hand to select, transport and distribute all colonists who can be assimilated, with the further privilege of issuing the necessary permits for their admission."

The Minister of Immigration said that during the present campaign he had on more than one occasion spoken of the new agreement with the railway companies to encourage immigrants of the proper type to settle in Canada. As to the quality of the immigrants to be brought to Canada under the arrangement arrived at with the railways, Mr. Gordon said that the railways are given no power under the agreement to bring to Canada any but immigrants of the quality which the immigration laws and regulations now permitted to enter Canada.

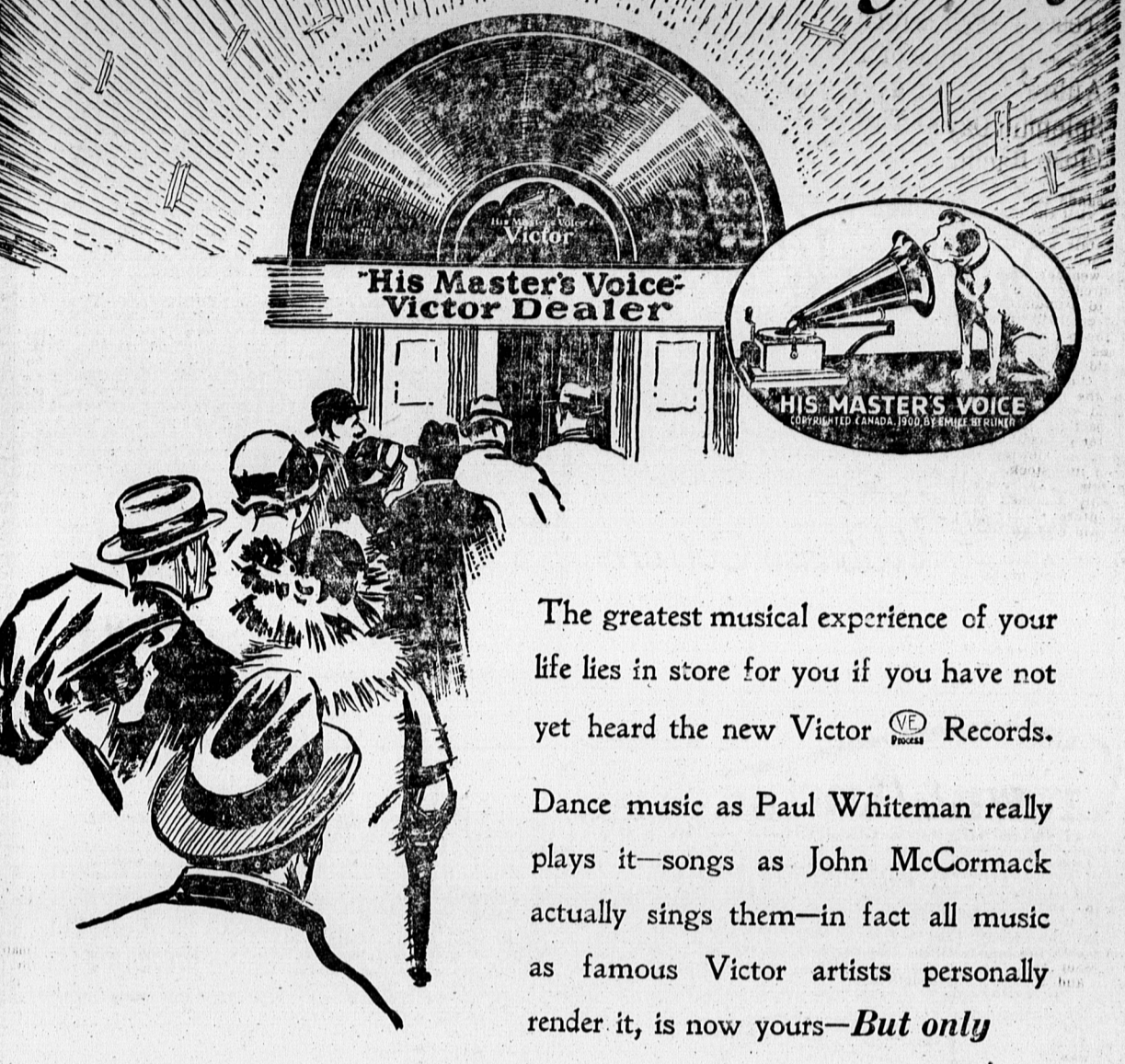

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### Cuyler Of Pirates Is Out For The Individual Honors

PITTSBURGH, Sept. 23.—Hazen "Kiki" Cuyler, youthful sensation of the Pirates, may not top the old circuit in clouting this season but he at least seems certain of winning several other individual honors.

One of these is in scoring runs, another is garnering triples and still another he's quite a bit on in front in run-scoring, having crossed the pan 10 more times than has Hornsby, his closest competitor. He's got an average of better than one run to the fracas. In crashing out triples, Cuyler is showing his heels to the rest of the field by a wide margin. He tops both major leagues in this respect, being some half a dozen in the lead of the best three-bagger swatsmen in the big show.

In swiping hassocks, Cuyler is finding a bunch of competition from his teammate Carey, generally acknowledged the base-stealing king in the old circuit. Cuyler stands an even chance to win, however.

The Pirate top is also right near the top in another department of play—hitting two-ply smashes. True, Bottomley, of the Cards, is present showing the way, but Cuyler is only a few behind and may yet overhaul the present leader.

All in all, Cuyler is having quite a successful year, despite the fact that it is only his second as a regular in the main tent.

### Canada First To Ratify Opium Convention

GENEVA, Sept. 23.—The Dominion of Canada was the first country to ratify the opium convention, Viscount Cecil announced to the League of Nations today. Viscount Cecil added that the British government had obtained the necessary powers from parliament to ratify the convention and said he hoped all the other states would act similarly.

Dr. W. A. Riddle of Canada stated that his country regarded the question as a very serious one and that the government would leave no stone unturned to protect its territory and the United States border against the drug traffic.
