LAST STEAMER EXPECTED—When the S. S. Karnoy, expected here this morning with fertilizer, loads a cargo of certified seed potatoes and turnips for Newark, N. J., it will probably be the last steamer sailing from a Prince Edward Island port this season. The harbor here was partially covered with lolly yesterday and if present cold weather continues will probably be frozen over within a short time. Cargo of the Karnoy will consist of approximately 100,000 bushels of tubers and turnips, supplied by the Canada Packers, Export Growers Association and Associated Shippers. The produce cargo will be loaded at Souris and Georgetown, it was said.

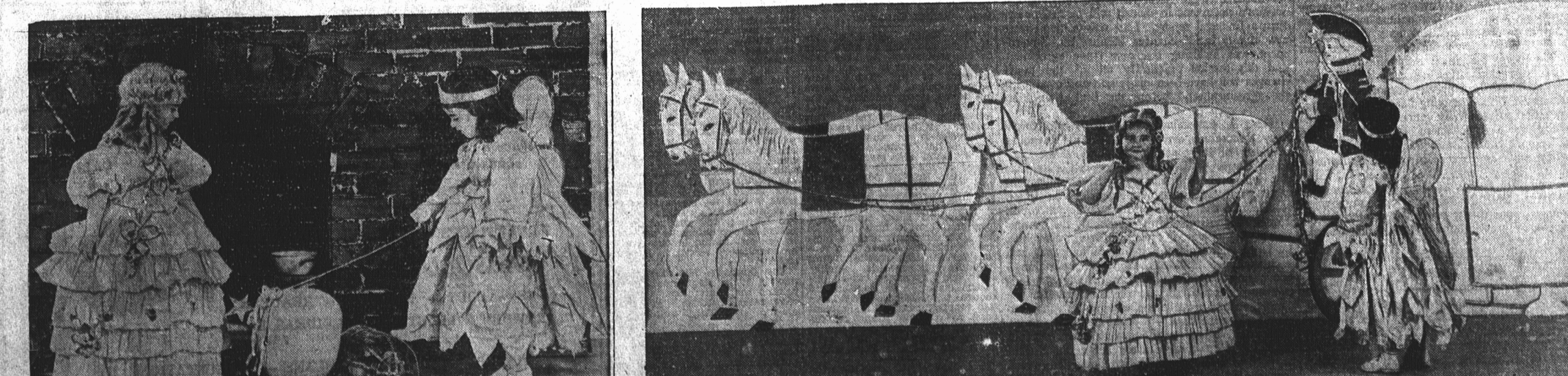
Successful Pelt Show Concluded

Yesterday was the concluding day for the first Provincial silver fox show which opened at the Canadian National Hotel here on Tuesday. Yesterday was visitor's day and from 10 a. m. until 10 p. m. the show was open to visitors. There was quite a fine attendance in the morning which increased to good proportions in the afternoon, while quite a large number of visitors saw the display in the evening. Many expressions of delight on the appearance of the pelts, on the way in which they were shown and on other features of the show were heard. All the ribbons were placed on the prize winners yesterday morning which left to the attractiveness of the display. Several flashlight photographs were taken of the show so there will be a pictorial record as well as the printed one which appeared in the press. In one of these photographs Miss Helen Wood of Southport appeared wearing some of the champion pelts. At 10 p. m. the show was dismantled and the pelts packed into cases and taken to the warehouse of the Charlotvetown Fur Sales for shipment later to C. M. Lampion in London. The chairman Mr. L. W. Hancock of Summerside and other members of the show committee expressed themselves yesterday as being very grateful to the hotel management and in fact to all who in any way assisted in making this first Provincial pelt show the success for the most parts in the show in open classes were compiled late Wednesday evening after the judging was completed by the doctor Mr. Andrew Jardine of Charlvetown was the winner of the trophy donated by the International Fox and Animal Foods, Ltd., closely following Mr. Jardine, Mr. H. As her magic wand touches each mouse it is a mouse no longer. Instead, right before Cinderella's eyes, stand four beautiful white horses. Then the pumpkin is put under the spell of the magic wand and it turns into a splendid coach. Cinderella is asked to fetch a trap with one rat in it. The rat becomes a fine coachman again thanks to the magic wand.
