Louis Wins Decision Over Bob Pastor

Ex-College Boxer Nearly Pulls Upset In Going Route With Brown Bomber

MADISON SQUARE GARDEN, New York, Jan. 29.—(AP)—Before a bowling, near capacity crowd of 10,000 Joe Louis, minus his fistic bombs, outpointed Bob Pastor, nimble ex-college boxer, tonight in a 10-round pursuit match that presented one of the strangest heavyweight spectacles witnessed in the Garden's battlepit in many a year.

PRESS SCORE SHEET

On the Associated Press score sheet Louis was credited with only five rounds—the first, fourth, fifth, eighth and ninth. Pastor took the second, third, sixth and tenth while the seventh was registered even.

Referee Arthur Donovan and the two judges, George Le Cron and Charley Lynch, scored unanimously for Louis.

The crowd, officially put at 18,864 customers, with gross gate receipts of \$111,570.60, boomed the verdict lustily and cheered Louis as the obviously crest-fallen Brown Bomber left the ring.

Pastor, who emerged unscathed as the first heavyweight to go the limit with Louis since the latter's knockout last June by Max Baer, smiling, didn't even lose the plaster patch that he wore over his left eye when the bout started.

Louis, slow, wild and completely baffled by his rival's tactics, showed around the ribs and kidneys, besides a sore nose that bled throughout the last five rounds.

Ringside critics, almost as completely wrong in their speculation over the outcome as they were in the Louis-Schmeling bout, quickly circulated reports of a "clean" Joe by Broadway betting men. Plenty of money had been wagered, it was said, against the chances of Pastor going the limit.

Louis, although always seemingly dangerous with either fist, failed to land anything resembling a knock-down punch. The bomber's left jabbed Pastor at intervals, including the fourth, fifth and eighth rounds, but he missed more blows than he connected. "Shufflin' Joe looked so slow at times as he tried to match his smaller rival's speedy footwork that he resembled a cigar-store Indian trying to swap punches at long range with a jumping jack.

Pastor, in retreat 9-10ths of the fight, covered more ground than a cross-country runner but he did it purposefully and accomplished his objective to go the route and keep his chin out of harm's way.

Eastern Stars, a local intermediate crew last night took the Highfield 2nd Granites into camp at Highfield by a 5-4 score in an exhibition encounter played at Highfield.

The game was close and fast throughout with the Stars winning the verdict in the last period, shooting the odd goal in five minutes after the two teams had entered the final stanza tied at 2-all.

CRYSTALS AGAIN DEFEATED BY ABEGWEITS

Morenz Abed, Hopeful Of Comeback

MONTREAL, Jan. 29.—A ruddy-faced fellow lay back on a raised hospital bed pillow today, brushed thinning hair from half-bald temples and mused on the hockey fate between occasional winners of pain from a leg suspended on a triangular brace above the bed.

Howie Morenz, bedded for at least six weeks because of a double fracture of the left leg, rubbed a hand over his face, showing clearly the effects of a sleepless night, and said quietly: "Don't count me out yet. It took 14 years to get me and they got me good. But don't count me out yet."

Howie, knocked out of Montreal Canadiens lineup in the midst of a comeback to the heights he vacated a few seasons ago, knew he was through for the season; perhaps a slight break in his voice, he asked you to "wait awhile and see."

"I'll tell you why. Whenever I've been injured before—and I've taken plenty of knocks—I've said to myself, 'I'll get better, it'll get better.' And it has, and that's just what I'm going to do this time. "Perhaps the old leg will come around and I'll be as good as new. It happens it won't, and well. . . ."

Howie pulled himself up on a bed and tried hard to smile. He didn't quite succeed. "Hell," he said, "I sure wanted to finish this season. I was back with Cec (Manager Cecil H. Bart of Canadiens) and the rest of the boys, and everything was going swell. If I could have finished this one off, I'd have been satisfied."

"You know," the one-time Stratford Streak reminisced. "Cec used to say to me: 'Now Howie, if you only had my head and your legs, what a hockey player you'd be.' "And," interjected pretty Mrs. Howie, sitting at the bedside "the first thing you said coming out of the other last night was, 'Hey, Cec. If I only had your legs and my head, I'd still be a hockey player.' " "Yeah?" muttered Howie. "I don't remember."

There was a stack of telegrams near Howie from the boys he plays at times in the NHL. He glanced at them, and at a few bouquets of flowers before going on. "You know, there was something missing inside when I was away the last two seasons. It's that old something—you know what I mean—and I got it again when I came back with Canadiens. And now I've got to stay in here for two months."

"It hurts just as much inside as that leg does, and the leg hurts plenty."

This was Howie's most serious injury in nearly 14 seasons in the big league. He'd broken a thumb five years back in a playoff game. There had been long lay-offs for various leg mishaps, but nothing as serious as the break he suffered when he went down after his skate caught in the rink boards Thursday night.

"Anyway, maybe the younger fellows will learn a lesson from this. I never used my toes skating, and I could have had the front of my skate rounded off. Then I wouldn't be here, and perhaps I'd have finished up on another Stanley Cup team."

"But Canadians will do it. Just wait and see. And, remember, don't count me out yet."

DOWN THE BACK STRETCH

Mr. T. V. Holdaway of Houlton, has forwarded a copy of the Portland Sunday Telegram and Press Herald, which carries on the sport page a cut of Bud Wenger, 2,054, Earl Avery up, which is headed: "Bud Wenger Proves Worthy Successor to John R. Braden," and follows with this write-up: "Bud Wenger, a pacing gelding which T.V. 'Vic' Holdaway of this town bought for a 'song' at the Topfield, Mass. auction in the fall of 1935 turned out to be one of the most consistent winners both on the Pine Tree and Maritime Provinces circuits last season. Down this way, Bud Wenger is held a worthy successor to those great Arctostock pacers, John R. Braden, Jackson Grattan and Dan Hedgeford. Under the careful training of Earl Avery of Woodstock, N.B., who succeeded with the nervous and high-strung pacer where others had failed, Bud Wenger set several new records for the Maritime tracks.

"Chief feat of the pacer's 1936 campaign was his three straight victory over an all-star field at Charlottetown, P.E.I. where he was credited with stepping to a new three heat record for Canada. The miles were made in 2:05 1-4, 2:03 and 2:05 3-4. His victims in this race were Calumet 2:07 3-4, Dermot 2:04 1-4, The Great Guy 2:02 1-4, Calumet Brownie 2:01 1-4, Guy Bitton 2:03 1-4 and Toll Gate 2:04 1-4.

Bud Wenger started 12 times last season, won seven of his races, was three times second and once split with Mildred May and Zombro Hanover, when with a heat apiece, the race was called on account of darkness. The gelding opened his season on June 25 with a straight heat victory at Woodstock. Later in the season he set a new track mark of 2:05 3-4 at Woodstock, and three weeks afterward clipped half a second off that mark. The previous Woodstock record was 2:06 1-2, made by Jackson Grattan seven years ago.

Another feature was a match race with Zombro Hanover, 2:01 1-4 at Houlton early in August. The Hanover horse won the first heat by a nose in 2:05 1-4; the second was a dead heat in 2:06 flat. Zombro Hanover forfeited the race.

ROUND BY ROUNDS

(A.P. By Guardian's Special Wire)
MADISON SQUARE GARDEN, New York, Jan. 29.—New York's Bob Pastor, although losing the official decision, sprang a major fistic sensation tonight by going the limit of 10 rounds against the Brown Bomber, Joe Louis, without once being knocked off his feet. A near capacity crowd howled in derision as Louis got the verdict in a disappointing match.

Fight by rounds follows: They came out of their corners slowly, sparring for an opening. Pastor backed off from the ropes and feinted without a blow being struck. Fully a minute elapsed before Louis chopped a hard right to Pastor's neck. They exchanged rights to the head. Pastor backed off after a hard right to the face. Bob was cautious and kept back peddling. Louis connected with a left hook lightly but with his right, Pastor landed both hands to the ribs and ducked a hard right swing. Joe pawed the air with his left but seemed in no hurry to swing into action. Pastor struck a straight left to the chin but Joe did not change expression. They were still sparring cautiously at the bell without any damaging blows being struck. It was Louis' round by a shade.

ROUND TWO
Louis bounced out of his corner and shot three lefts to the face. Joe worked his left rapidly as Pastor backed off. Bob kept moving and connected with a light left before clinching. Louis clubbed his rival twice with short rights to the ear. They clinched after Louis landed a short left uppercut. Pastor landed both hands to the stomach and bounced off the ropes swinging briskly. Bob shot another right to the body, but missed a hard right for Joe's chin. The pace was faster but Louis still showed little inclination to mix. Pastor stung Louis with two sharp lefts to the jaw. Joe blinked and countered with a hard right swing that grazed Bob's chin just before the bell. It was Pastor's round.

ROUND THREE
Pastor circled Louis in midring, connected with a light left and (Continued on page 10)

Garrison Finish By Local Squad Sends Summerside Team Down To 5-2 Defeat

Shooting four goals in a lightning-fast third period after losing an early lead, Jackie Kane's Abbies last night drew up on even terms with Summerside Crystals when they defeated the western crew 5 to 2 in the first game of the second session of the Island Hockey League.

Gaining a one-goal lead in a dull and uninteresting first period, only to see their opponent's counter attack give them a 2-1 advantage at the end of the middle canto, Abbies turned on the heat in the final chukker, and led by the fine brilliance of Whalen and Kane and spectacular goal-tending by Ray Stull, skated off with a substantial lead. The Crystals went down fighting gallantly but could not match the smooth-skating, effortless attacks of the locals in the final period. Abbies took exactly four minutes and ten seconds to jump into a two-goal lead in the exciting third period and the losers after that could not dent the defensive armor that the local team threw up in front of the brilliant Stull.

It was a pleasing victory to local fans who had watched their team take two straight lickings on home ice. But last night it was a real old-fashioned Abegweit finish that the 1937 coor-beaters staged. Fresh from their win in Summerside, the youngsters, led by the cagey playing of the veteran Kane, showed more confidence and as a result their game showed marked improvement. With the exception of the second session it was Abbies all the way; they made few mistakes defensively and although they missed plenty scoring chances Crystals also were lax in this department. But throughout the teams showed plenty of smart hockey. With the exception of the first period the teams skated fast both ways, with the scene of action shifting rapidly from one defensive zone to the other.

Throughout a penalty dotted first period Abbies held an edge over their opponents. Crystals forced hard as Abbies found themselves shorthanded two players through penalties but two minutes later Crystals were in the same predicament and the Abbies were quick to take advantage of the break. Smith raced to the line and sent Bradley into the clear with a sweet pass, but the latter's high shot was deflected; Stewart was Johnny-on-the-spot, however, as he raced in to poke the rubber past the over-worked Larkins. A minute later Stewart was stopped by Larkins and the Abbies sprang to the attack again as Crystals found themselves two men short for the second time but this time the visitors held the locals off until the bell.

Just as the Crystals had got back to full strength in the second period two quick penalties left the Abbies two short and this time there was no stopping the Crystals as Charlie Cahill took Montgomery's pass in the clear and skated in to draw Stull and score easily.

For the third time in the game Crystals were two men short as Montgomery and Cahill drew sentences but, the goal they had scored had given them plenty of fight and while still shorthanded they shot into the lead as Schurman raced in fast to poke Montgomery's rebound into the cage.
