**COSTLY PERSIAN TREASURES EXHIBITED IN LONDON SOON**

LONDON, November 24.—In London now there is a magic carpet—almost as magic as any that has figured in fairy tales. It is part of the \$10,000,000 Persian art treasures which have been unpacked in secret at the Royal Academy vaults in Piccadilly for exhibition in January. The carpet covers a huge octagon of the Royal Academy, where the statuary usually is shown. It is a seventeenth century "woven mystery" from a mosque never entered by unbelievers, and its beauty is exquisite poetry. Experts agree that if it were put up for auction \$2,500,000 would be moderate bidding.

Strange exotic flowers and graceful cypress bloom amid its rainbow weave. The harmony of its coloring and the gorgeousness of its design are wonders whose secrets are fast kept in the Persian strange places. For a time it will hang on a London wall. It is believed that none of the Persian treasure has ever been seen by Christians, with the exception of one or two privileged scholars.

While a special squad of police guarded the entrance of the Royal Academy vaults a little group, including a high official of the Persian Government, a customs officer and Persian art experts watched the opening of the cases. A case was dragged forward—what would it contain? The jewels from the hair of some long dead Persian beauty, a cluster of emeralds . . . a cup of gold? Quick hammering and the sharp crackle of splintering wood sent the group craning eagerly forward. An expert bent and reverently raised something wrapped in 20 coverings. Gold vessels from the palace of the Shah! Solid gold, fierce as flame, in the glaring electric, great cups with enamel flowers writhing up the stems; tightly salvers for dainty sweetmeats, stiff with pearls, solid gold bowls for water, ewers, and giant wine vessels.
