Display of Bloom

The first objective of brand-new planters is usually a continuous display of bloom. This requires a bit of planning especially to get something showing during the very early part of the season, and also for the tail-end after the first frost. In this planning a good Canadian seed catalogue will be of immense help as it gives the time of blooming with each variety, the color, height and hardness and other pointers.

An Early Start

An extra early start in blooming can be obtained by using well-ripened plants either out of one's own green house or hotbed or purchased in flats from seedsmen or nurseriesmen. There plants are just about ready to bloom when bought. Indeed some of them may have the odd bloom on them when still in the boxes. Experts, however, advise against leaving this bloom on at transplanting. It puts a strain on the plant and is apt to decay. If the plants are to be transplanted from the shock of transplanting and will make stockier.

Dodgers take 12-inning win From Cards

BROOKLYN, May 8—(AP)—The dauntless Dodgers snatched a 5-4 victory out of the shadows of dusk today with two singles in the 12th inning against St. Louis Cardinals and moved into first place in the National League before a crowd of 22,039.

The pay-off came after two were out. Ducky Medwick hit a grounder at third baseman Jimmy Brown and went all the way to second when Brown overthrew first. The play was scored as a hit and an error. Then Cookie Lavagetto slashed the first pitch back at Brown, who deflected the ball past shortstop Slaters Marion for another single and the winning run.

At Philadelphia, aided for the second day in row by a home-run hitting pitcher, Chicago Cubs defeated the Phillies 5-1 to sweep a two-game series.

Verne Olsen, who scattered 10 hits among the Phils, homered in the fourth inning with two men on base.

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
