Word has been received by Postmaster Wheat, of the death of Frederick H. Barnard, who has many relatives on P. E. Island. His father Thomas G. Barnard was a son of the late Jabez Barnard so well remembered by the older citizens of Charlottetown. The deceased visited the Island some years ago and was the guest of his cousin S. F. Hodgson. Mr. Barnard prior to his death resided in Minneapolis.

L. E. PROWSE was a passenger last night by the Princess. As announced in The Guardian a week ago the business carried on in Charlottetown under the name of Prowse Brothers and the Sydney business of Prowse Bros. & Crowell will be turned into a joint stock company. Mr. Crowell has given an option on the Sydney business and it is understood that he will take charge of it. If he does so, the new company will at once open up in a store now owned by L. E. Prowse situated near the present establishment. If Mr. Crowell does not take up the option, he will retire from the business. The capital stock of the new company has been fixed at \$150,000. Of this amount \$20,000 will be held as treasury stock, \$80,000 will be taken up by L. E. Prowse and B. C. Prowse in equal shares and the remaining \$50,000 will be sold. There will not be any change in the management of the Charlottetown business for the present.

A NEW BRUNSWICK horse buyer, who lately visited P. E. Island in search of a driver, says that he never met a more independent set of men than are the Island farmers. At one place he was shown a handsome young mare, and just because he offered a mild criticism, the farmer rushed the animal into the stable and refused to talk sale any more. The N. B. man wanted to buy the mare but was refused the privilege of so doing. The next day he had to give \$25 more for her, and had to pay another man \$10 for securing the animal for him. He says the Island farmers have lots of money and if you dine at a farm house in nearly every case the bill of fare is away ahead of city hotels. **DEVELOPING NOVA SCOTIA INDUSTRIES**

Grindstone Works in Cumberland Equal to the Best in America.

AMHERST, Dec. 4.—Mr. Harry F. Huestis of Providence, Rhode Island, the promoter of, and a director and large stock holder in the Atlantic Grindstone Coal and Railway Company, Limited, passed through Amherst this week enroute for Lower Gove in this County, where the valuable grindstone and coal properties owned by this company are situated.

Mr. Huestis, in an interview, informed your correspondent that the properties were in good condition, and that the prospects were excellent for a heavy season's work next season. At the quarries a new and very superior reef of grindstone has been opened up and will be uncovered, ready for work as soon as the season opens up next spring. Mr. Huestis states that this new reef will afford sufficient stone out of the part already opened up, to keep the mills in constant operation all the season, and this will make the output of stone for the season the largest in the history of the quarries which is saying nothing of the work which has been in continuous operation since 1798. The plant is now in better condition for work than ever before in its history. It is extensively fitted up with the most modern grindstone machinery, and is one of the largest and best equipped grindstone works in America.

A couple of years ago the Company obtained possession of the old Hardscrabble Cold Mine, a mine celebrated for its excellent quality of coal and its easy output. This mine is situated about half a mile from the grindstone quarries with which it is to be connected by rail. The Company have just completed new Bankhead buildings which were constructed by Rhodes, Gurry and Company, Limited of Amherst, and have installed a complete plant of the latest up to date mining machinery which was put in by a New Glasgow firm. The mine is now for the first time in a position to work to the best advantage, and great things are expected of it.

While Mr. Huestis at present hails from the land of the stars and stripes we do not forget that he was born and bred in Cumberland County, and he does not forget that fact either, and it gives us great pleasure to see our own boys returning from other lands and opening up and developing these large industries in their native Province, the good old Province of Nova Scotia.
