Found Guilty

reply from him might be properly expected. In a serious charge such as exists here if this were the only evidence against the accused I would be inclined to place little value on it. What is the other evidence? When Kenneth McBeth was relating the conversation he had in his own house with the accused on the night of the 22nd of April the following question was put:

"You said something that you told him what Jessie had told you. I want to get that."

"A—Well Jessie—I told him that Jessie said that he was giving her drugs to cause an abortion."

"Q—He didn't deny it. He said I take it all and keep quiet. Everything will be all right and I will marry Jessie."

The same witness in relating a conversation he had with the accused on the night of May 19th while he was driving him from Charlottetown to Bellevue was asked:

"Q—Tell us what conversation took place between you that night from Charlottetown to Bellevue."

"A—Well I accused him of giving Jessie drugs to cause an abortion. He said he had been let things alone it would have been better."

The same witness relates that when he was leaving Moncton for home on May 19th meeting the accused in front of the Bank of Montreal he asked him if he had money enough and on replying that he had the accused said he could get some and "if I wanted some he could get some in here."

He also in giving the conversation between them on the night of May 19th on the way to Bellevue states that the accused offered to give him money to pay all the bills for Jessie and stated that if he would give it to pay for it himself that people would think that he was in the fault. And on finally leaving him near his home on that night "he said that anything he had I could have it." This evidence was in no way modified or weakened by the cross examination.

Then there are the other circumstances related by the witness Hugh S. McLeod. It will be recalled that Jessie's mother came to Charlottetown on May 11th and not finding her daughter as she expected in the Hospital she became much alarmed. The daughter had left there on April 30th and left Charlottetown on May 2nd arriving in Dr. Oulton's office in Shediac the same afternoon. The witness McLeod in a conversation with the accused near Zion Church corner on May 12th states that he told the accused of the disturbed condition of Jessie's mother and that she was calling for her daughter and that a doctor had to be sent for to quiet her and that he asked the accused: "Where is Jessie?" The answer made was that "she was getting the best of care and attention where she was, getting complete quietness and rest and that she would be all right." McLeod then asked him to tell him in confidence where she was—that he would not tell her people where she was but that he could assure them that he knew where she was and that she was in good hands." The information was not given but the accused said "he would take her home tomorrow afternoon." That would be impossible for Jessie was then in Shediac under the care of Dr. Oulton.

There are also the visits of the accused on March 10th and April 22nd to the girl's home, his appearance at Shediac when she was being treated by Dr. Oulton, his driving her from Shediac to the Moncton Hospital in Dr. Oulton's car and his appearance in Moncton on May 18th and 19th.

I am unable to ignore, I cannot shut my eyes to this mass of undisputed evidence. It may be that none of it except Kenneth McBeth's would be sufficient to prove the guilt of the accused, but the weight of the latter evidence is certainly by no means lessened by the facts and circumstances just mentioned.

Was the drug supplied noxious? The evidence discloses that the girl was taking drugs to bring on a miscarriage. That these were having a most deleterious effect on her health, rendering her pale and weak, necessitating her being confined to her bed very frequently during February, March and April and causing at frequent intervals much blood flowing. The accused's connection with supplying these drugs has been established. These facts seem to bring the case in line with R. vs Cramp already referred to.

Having therefore taken into due consideration the evidence bearing on the case and giving the accused the benefit of every reasonable doubt I find him guilty of the charge preferred against him.

DRIFT IN DEMPSEY'S FAVOR SEEN, EVEN MONEY LIKELY

CHICAGO, Sept. 21.—Pre-battle preparations for the Dempsey-Tunney heavyweight championship 10-round match Thursday night at Soldiers Field approached a climax today with these outstanding developments:—

1.—Continued reports of a decided drift in Jack Dempsey's favor, with wagers on Gene Tunney down to odds of 6 to 5 in many instances and prospects of even money betting by tomorrow.

2.—A new "flood" of counterfeit tickets, of all denominations from \$5 to \$40, announced Tex Rickard, and resulting in increased vigilance by federal and local agents.

3.—Conference of State Athletic Commission with rival managers of both fighters on rules, together with reports that the commission had further whittled down the referee candidates to three men, generally supposed to be Walter Eckersall, newspaperman; George Lytton, business man, and David Miller, wealthy sportsman and veteran official of Chicago.

4.—Dismissal by federal court of a suit by Rev. Elmer Williams to stop the fight on grounds that it endangers public morals and postponement until tomorrow of application for permanent injunction by the Coliseum Athletic Club based on claims of prior contract with Dempsey to fight Harry Willis here last year.

CHARGES REPEATED

5.—Retiteration by Dempsey of alleged efforts to "frame" his losing battle with Tunney last year, on the basis of the ex-champion's now famous "open letter," and assertion that he still was determined to force an answer from the titleholder.

Although Tunney remained a decided favorite among newspaper critics, more than 1,200 of whom are gathering here from all parts of the country as well as foreign lands, the indication that Dempsey

P. E. I. Protestant Orphanage Meeting

We are very pleased that so many friends read carefully this Review. In it we endeavor to give the inside information, dwelling particularly on items of greatest interest and concern to all.

Since our last review four children have been received in and one adopted out, thus increasing our number by three.

As might be expected adoptions are most frequent during summer when the Home is more easily reached, consequently our inmates decrease during this period and in winter their places are filled again. Our aim is not to keep the children in the Orphanage but rather to place them as soon as possible in suitable foster homes.

While in our care they are well cared for, professional services are always available and it is noteworthy that for more than three years past, sickness has been but slight, and no death has occurred.

Frequently we are commended for the excellent appearance of the Home and also the Grounds which have now been wonderfully improved through the generosity of Mr. Adam Andrew. We are quite susceptible to praise but praise will not retain the efficiency needed.

During the month we have received as donations: \$400.00 from Memorial L. O. B. A. City and \$35.00 from the Kensington Ladies Auxiliary a total of \$75.00.

May we ask our Protestant people who own and control the Orphanage a simple question—Are we, your elected trustees to understand that this \$75.00 is expected to run your Institution for the month? We are pleased to announce another addition of \$100.00 to our Endowment Fund recently received from the family of the late Neil McCannell, Lorne Valley.

This fund is the hope of the Institution for the future but as yet the interest from it is too small to be of very great help. We have a standing order on our books that all Bequests shall go into this fund and only the interest be used unless otherwise stated. The maintenance is the most serious problem and has been for some time. Every corner of the Province should help, and in every Protestant settlement someone should undertake to forward collections. Volunteers are sorely needed if expenses are to be kept down. The ideal time for collecting is near at hand and we would be overjoyed to receive offers of help.

Payments on Debt Pledges are coming in very slowly; the time limit is almost up and the Board is discussing various plans for hastening the remainder.

These pledges were all accepted in good faith and in keeping with that should not our public be informed of the result of the campaign in the same detail as at the beginning; if then all subscribers together with their amounts were published in the press can it be a breach of faith on our part to again publish the names and show clearly how each pledge has been kept?


About two months of the time limit yet remains and during that time the Board will decide whether the list will be published in the press or reserved for the Annual Report at the first of the year.

Less than \$7,000.00 of debt now remains to be paid and this is much more than covered by pledges overdue. Whatever clouds may linger over our Orphanage work we have become accustomed to line them with silver on both edges in this review for we begin it and end it with reference to the children.

The children in the Home are much like your own. They are ushered into a world they know nothing of and as they grow they are fed by us mentally as well as physically. When grown they are what we have made them and their end is as their life.

A great responsibility rests upon all parents and our Protestant people must assume the part of parents towards the children in our Orphanage in fact they have been assuming it.

Those who have outgrown the Home and gone forth into the world are now playing the game of life as we taught them to play it. Are you satisfied with their knowledge of the game? Are you doing what is in your power for those still over here, that they may become worthy citizens of this Christian Land and in the end be accepted by


