MEXICAN AERONAUT MAKES NOTABLE FLIGHT

MEXICO CITY, March 2.—Roland G. Garros, made the most notable flight of his war here when he sent a fifty horsepower monoplane to a registered altitude of 4,000 feet today. He was in the air 36 minutes and circled the historic Castle of Capultepec. President Diaz had been notified in advance that if conditions were favorable the birdman would attempt to salute him as he sailed over the city.

A DRASTIC ACTION

ROTTERDAM, Holland, Mar. 1.—Rodolph B. Tinsley, director of the Uranium Steamship line, who is now in Berlin, has been prohibited from returning to Holland.

This drastic action of the Dutch authorities is the outcome of the trans-Atlantic emigrant traffic dispute which arose from Germany's refusal to permit Russians returning from America aboard the steamer Volturino to pass through Germany. Tinsley is a British subject. The order of the crown forbidding his presence in Holland was received this morning by the chief commissioner of police. It is based upon the law governing the residence of foreigners in Holland.
