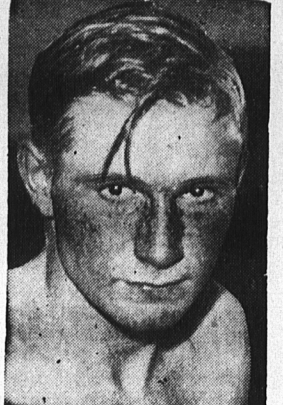
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STOLE THE SHOW

Interpreting The War

The menace to Britain in the Middle East from Vichy's surrender to German pressure for collaboration is so grave that it has drawn attention momentarily from developments of the Anglo-German war front in the Atlantic.
Yet there are definitely favorable omens there for Britain to the omens in Iraq and in Syria. Nor should it be overlooked, in attempting to assess the trends of the war, that British-American opinion generally agrees that it is in the Atlantic that victory or defeat must come.

He who emerges from this war as master of the Atlantic will shape the destinies of Europe and profoundly influence those of the rest of the world.

Even the Hess incident emphasizes the German conclusion that it is in the Atlantic, where it began with the sinking of the British liner Athenia off the Hebrides Sept. 3, 1939, that the war must end.

Whatever his Hitler-assigned or self-imposed "peace" mission to Britain (if such it is), Hess, one of the first among Hitler's henchmen and first among Hitler's war prisoners in Britain, reflects that fundamental war conception. Obviously he could not see in Nazi victories the means of fulfillment of the Nazi dream. For he made his bid for fame, whatever its true motive, at a time when German prestige, military and diplomatic, was at a new peak.

Dark as is the outlook eastward for Britain, matters are taking for the moment a brighter turn in the Atlantic. More than two months ago, the German conclusion that it is in the Atlantic, where it began with the sinking of the British liner Athenia off the Hebrides Sept. 3, 1939, that the war must end.

And to cap this favorable development, United States help for Britain is expanding, its full measure or method yet to be revealed. But it already has insured both American sea scouting to help keep the Atlantic open and added merchant shipping space to keep Britain going in the Atlantic through this crucial summer, fall and winter.

Boxing popular With R.A.F. men

SOMEWHERE IN ENGLAND, May 18—(CP)—Boxing, always popular in the Royal Air Force, is being stimulated still more by visits Pilot Officer Len Harvey, British and Empire heavyweight champion, is paying to Air Force stations. Harvey is a physical fitness officer in the R.A.F. Volunteer Reserve. One of his most successful exhibitions was given in a hangar at a bomber command station. Harvey was the feature attraction of a long boxing program in which air-men from many other stations took part.

Spectators included the air officer commanding the group, many members of the W.A.A.F., bomber crews and ground staff. Altogether more than 1,200 spectators crowded the hangar for the show. The hangar was cleared of aircraft and a ring set up in the middle, brightly lighted by lamps swung from the high roof. Bomber crews in flying kit, stood at the edge of the crowd, waiting for orders to send them over Germany.

The army co-operated by providing a demonstration of "do's" and "don'ts" of boxing, an amusing and instructive item in which illegal fighting was exaggerated to point out the moral and explain the duties of a referee.

Officers and airmen came from other stations by bus and car and one station sent an orchestra.

WIN EASTERN U.S. AMATEUR

NEW YORK, May 18—(CP)—Washington Eagles, playing their second season in the Eastern United States Amateur Hockey League won the 1940-41 championship with a record-breaking total of 42 victories against 15 defeats and eight ties for an all-time high of 92 points in 65 games, according to official records.

Baltimore Orioles, who threatened the Eagles for a spell and even held first place for a while, finished seven games off the pace with 78 points. Atlantic City was third with 69 points.

Vital Australian Election May 24

CANBERRA, May 18—(AP)—An electorate, numbered at 71,000 is ready to go to the polls May 24 in the Boothby, South Australia, by-election which may decide whether the government of Prime Minister Robert Menzies continues in office or whether Labor leader John Curtin may seek formation of a labor government.

The election, to fill the seat in the House of Representatives left vacant by the death of John Price, a United Australia party supporter, is of vital importance because of the almost equal representation of government and labor parties in the House.

The present standing is: government 35 including speaker; labor 36; independent 2. One of the independents is considered a government supporter. The government has a majority in the Senate where an election is not expected before 1943.

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Rampant Dodgers Halted By Chicago Cubs 7-4

Red Wings win Doubleheader

NEW YORK, May 18—(AP)—Brooklyn Dodgers, riding the crest of the National League with 22 victories in their last 26 games, bowed at Chicago today before the Cubs, 7-4.

The Cubs, handicapped all the way by shoddy fielding, finally knocked Whitlow Wyatt, Dodger ace, out of the box in the seventh inning. The loss ended Wyatt's winning streak at seven straight games and marked the first time this season that he has been knocked out of the box. He has made nine starts.

At St. Louis, big Johnny Mize singled with the bases loaded in the ninth inning to give the Cardinals a 6-5 victory over Philadelphia Phillies and lift them to within one game of first place in the league.

Mize had doubled and scored on a single by Martin Marlon to even the score 5-5 in the eighth inning.

At Cincinnati, big Paul Derringer, whose victory over Chicago eight days ago was followed by Reds longest losing streak in more than 300 games, ended the setback string at six by whipping Boston Braves 4-3.

Derringer got into trouble in the second and third innings when Boston scored six runs, but he blanked Casey Stengel's team from there on. He allowed seven hits and fanned nine.

New York Giants spotted Pirates four runs in the first two innings at Pittsburgh and then came on in the stretch to win by a nose, 5-4.

It was the Giants' fourth straight victory and then end of a three-game winning streak for the Buccos.

A three-run outbreak in the 12th inning broke up a tight baseball game Saturday and gave Boston a 6-3 decision over St. Louis.

Rookie John Podany, product of Ottawa Senators of the Canadian-American League, outpitched Bucky Walters to give Philadelphia Phillies a 2-1 victory over Cincinnati Reds.

Five-hit pitching by Cliff Melton and a 13-hit attack by his mates brought New York Giants a 9-0 victory over Chicago Cubs.

Budpath wins Historic Plate

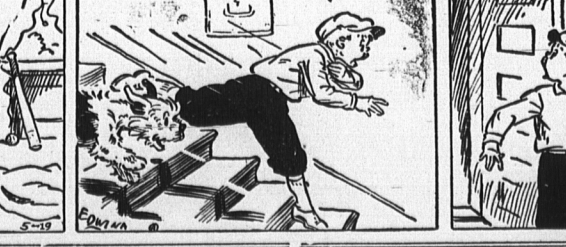

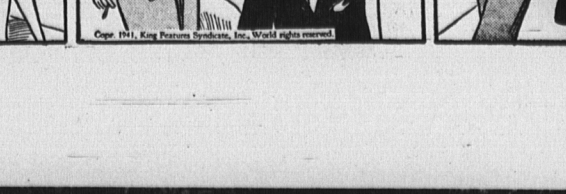

Prairie races Promises best In contenders

WINNIPEG, May 18—(CP)—Leading Canadian-bred race horses from the Pacific Coast to Quebec are entered in the West's two richest races of 1941—the Canadian Derby and Winnipeg Futurity—for three-year-olds and two-year-olds that mark the closing cards of Manitoba's 28-day racing program.

Undisturbed is a son of Stand Pat who also is the sire of Giddings' Ten-of-Ace, a stable contender eligible for the 12th Winnipeg Futurity to be run at the same track July 4. Of the 40 qualified starters the Whittier Park Stock Farm, the Dominion's leading breeding center near Winnipeg, has eight talented sprinters for the 1-2 furlong event.

Many Entries
In the Derby practically all of the 1940-top-flight Canadian bred two-year-olds, including 21 from Alberta, 14 from Manitoba, six each from Ontario and British Columbia and one from Spokane, Wash., were entered on receipt of the final payment by the Prairie Thoroughbred Breeders and Racing Association.

The H. G. Hatch stable of Toronto, winner of the Manitoba Derby, predecessor of the Canadian Derby, in 1936 and 1937, when Sweepen and Goudie crossed the line in front, is expected to ship Budpath, 8th ranking Canadian two-year-old and winner of this year's running of the King's plate, to the Manitoba capital for his third bid.

Such prominent western bred as the Whittier Park Stock Farm's Flamingo, fourth ranking 1940, Mrs. R. L. Rockefeller's Flint Brom from Spokane and K. Inasmusar H. Duke from Calgary, fifth and sixth finishers in 1940, are among the favorites.

Another is Lee William's Homestr from Edmonton, winner of four races and never out of the money in six starts. Those that might pull a surprise include:

L. H. Appleby's Swift Heels from Vancouver; Whittier Park Stock Farm's Plying Su and Wilkie; Mrs. L. H. Davidson's Just Betty from Edmonton; Mrs. T. Stevenson's Shanty Boy from Hamilton; George McChugach's Salmon Leap and A. G. Auld's Bush House, both Toronto runners, and Mrs. F. Merrill's Mary's Lullaby from London, Ont. Reds.

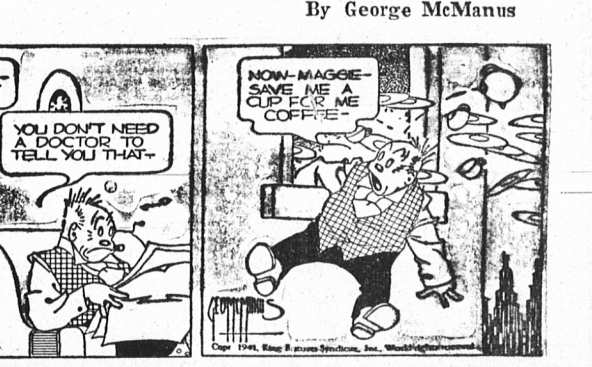
Other Prospects

Youville, Fairy Witch, Fighting Finn, Witch's Taxi, Toy Brom, Panbroom, Blow-Me-Down, and Broome's Sentry, are the Whittier prospects but J. D. Kennedy's Junction Barry is much talked of among turfmen here as the juvenile capable of pulling a surprise. The Winnipeg owner named his horse after Renton Barry, leading thoroughbred breeder of western Manitoba whose home is at Russell, Man.

Joey, the little speeder who won the Futurity in 1932 and went on to become Canada's leading thoroughbred before being retired after the 1940 racing season on the Pacific Coast, made the name of L.P. Jacques of Calgary a byword on Canadian tracks. This year Jacques will bid for the two-year-old honors with Newsway Lady, sired by Yankee Doodle. Newsway Lady is one of Alberta's 17 eligibles.

Vancouver is represented by two sons of Dolan, a Pacific Coast sire of note. They are Little Dee and Build Up, both owned by Appleby.
