### INTERESTING DEBATE

The students of the Long Course on Friday evening held a debate in the Prince of Wales College, the subject being "Resolved that country life is more conducive to happiness than city life." It was opened by Leo McDonald, who, in support of his argument in favour of country life, pointed out the high cost of living in the city and spoke of the healthy atmosphere of the country. He was followed by Lewis Pearson of Charlottetown, who took exception to the assertion that country life was healthier than city life. He referred to the great number of farmers who suffered from rheumatism and diseases induced by wet and cold, and stated that the farmer had his feet wet a great many days of the year. He reminded his hearers of the good roads and schools of the city. Benjamin Gallant said that he had lived in the city for some time and had also an experience of country life. As a point of the poverty of people in the city and the hardships they endured, which was a condition of affairs he had never seen in the country. He thought that the country was the best place for those who were not well off. Victor Moore of St. John's, who took the affirmative side, emphasized the conveniences afforded by education and sanitation and also the regularity with which labourers in the city were paid compared with the payment of these men in the country. He noted that as soon as persons acquired any appreciable wealth they moved to the city, showing that they thought the advantages of the city were worth the disadvantages. Thomas Moore of St. Peter's, spoke of the advantages which the young men had in the country. He had his horse and rik and was "his own boss," whereas, in the city, he was always working for some person else. He said that many persons came from the city to the country on a holiday and were reluctant to return. Keith McGowan, of Malpeque, thought that there were conveniences of sanitation in the country, or if there were not, there should be. There was no reason why there should not be. He referred to the rural free delivery and the telephone, both of which had made country life very attractive. Edgar McKenna spoke along the same lines as the ordinary man in the city, he said, was a labourer for wages and very often he did not have all the conveniences which had been so frequently talked about. There were pleasures in the country which the city boy could not enjoy, such as the stars, as fishing and skating on the mill pond. The other speakers emphasized these and other points in the discussion, after which a vote was taken, when the resolution was carried by a large majority. The speaking throughout showed a marked improvement on the former debate, and it is the intention to continue these interesting debates, making them a regular part of the Long Course work.

## FIELD CROPS

The Secretary of Agriculture of this province estimates the field crops and their marked value at \$8,136,000 for the year 1913. The value of the milk received at the creameries at about \$500,000, eggs and poultry exports at about \$700,000, cattle, sheep and hogs shipped, either dead or alive, from the province, at \$600,000, the fisheries at \$2,000,000 and the value of the increase of foxes this year at \$4,000,000. The value of the fisheries, field crop, and foxes together amount to about \$4,000,000. The following is an estimate of the field crops and their market prices:
