Vindicated By Labor Gov't

(Special to The Guardian.)
LONDON, Sept. 16.—Government employees who refused to fight in the Great War owing to conscientious objections, have been vindicated by the Labor Government. By order of the Right Hon. Philip Snowden, Chancellor of the Exchequer, issued tonight, all penalties and disabilities imposed upon them by their action, have been removed. Except in the Defense Dept., says the order, no person shall in future be ineligible for appointment to any place in the civil service by reason of the fact that military service was declined on the grounds of conscientious objection and the fact that a civil servant was a "concochle" is no longer to be regarded as a bar to his promotion over the head of ex-service men.
By thus removing the penalties, the Labor Government has reversed its decision when in office in 1924, when it affirmed adherence to the action taken in the Lloyd George Coalition Government of 1922.


